County to Auction More Than 5,000 Lots on July 1

More than 5,000 parcels of property in this locality and other sections of the county, on which no taxes have been paid for five years, will be offered for sale to the highest bidder on Tuesday, July 1, according to County Tax Collector Howard Byram.

Any of the parcels not sold will be deeded to the state, as was done a year ago. This is only the second year these sales have been conducted on July 1, as up until a year ago there was a state moratorium against such sales.

Record owners of the properties have until the hour of the sale to redeem them, Byram explains. This requires payment not only of the back taxes but also penalties and interest. About 100,000 parcels of land still are tax-deeded in this county.

Electrical Industry Expanding to Meet U. S. Defense Needs

Defense production demands on the electrical industry of the Pacific Coast are being safeguarded by increased generating and transmission facilities. C. E. Houston, president of the Pacific Coast Electrical Association, declared this week in announcing the association's twenty-fourth annual convention May 21-24 at Hotel del Coronado, Coronado.

"New and extended demands are being made on all phases of the electrical industry with the gaining momentum of the national defense program," Houston, vice-president and assistant general manager of the Southern California Edison Company, said. "On the part of the utilities, coordinated planning and effort, as evidenced by the installation of greater generating capacity and augmented interconnections linking the power resources of the coast area, has geared the industry for its biggest task. And research engineers, manufacturers, contractors and all others of the industry as individuals and unified branches are organized for peak performance."

 Ever increasing in popularity are Griffith Observatory's exhibits, telescopes, and planetarium in Los Angeles. The hill-top view point will be open every day from 2 p. m. to 10 p. m. Memorial Day through Labor Day.
 Planetarium demonstrations are conducted daily at 3:30 and 8:30 p. m. offering new lecture subjects each week. An admission fee of 25 cents is charged for the lecture. The 12-inch Zeiss telescope is available when darkness and other conditions warrant. A lunar telescope affords moon surface study.
 Twinkling lights of the city below and the stars above make the observatory an essential visit for the southern California sightseer interested in inspiring views.
