

San Pedro and Torrance Teams Win Marine League Track Meet



THEIRS WAS THE THRILLER . . . TWO RECORDS BROKEN AND ONE EQUALLED AT LOMITA

By piling up a total of 69 points, San Pedro high school's varsity track team won its fourth straight Marine League meet last Thursday on Narbonne's field in Lomita. Narbonne finished second with 42 1/2, Torrance was third with 29 1/2, Banning fourth with 24, El Segundo fifth with 10 1/2 and Gardena collected 4 1/2 for cellar spot.

San Pedro also took the Class B championship, the third win in four years of competition, piling up the record total of 86 1/2 points. Narbonne placed second with 30 1/2, Torrance was third with 16, Gardena got 15, Banning took 10 and El Segundo trailed with seven points.

Torrance won the Class C crown with 51 1/2 points. Other totals in this division were: Gardena 32, San Pedro 28, Banning 12, El Segundo 8 and Narbonne 4 1/2. The meet was the second win for the Tartar mid-gets, having previously won in 1939.

Dead Heat in 880. Two league records were shattered in Varsity events and a third equalled. Jack Hollar of Narbonne who had set a new mark in the shot-put in the May 21 trials, added a few inches last Thursday to establish a distance of 52 ft. 10 1/2 in. for the record. San Pedro's Class A relay team tied a 1939 San Pedro quartet's mark for the time in that event when they completed the half-mile in 1m.32s.

The feature attraction of the meet was the dead-heat run by Gerald McDonald of Torrance and Paul Iacono of San Pedro in the 880. They set a new league record of 1m.59.5s.

Dick Bauer and Paul Iacono of San Pedro were the only double winners of the meet. Bauer took first in the 100 and 220-yard sprints, repeating his double victory of last year, while Iacono had a dead heat for the 880 and won the low hurdles.

All-City Meet June 13 San Pedro captured five of the Varsity first places and tied for two others. The Bucs took all but one first in class B running events. The Pirates had previously nabbed four top spots in field events. Buchan was the only mid-geet in Class C to score for San Pedro. Torrance taking six of the nine firsts.

Finalists in the Marine league qualified for the All-City meet, with each school being allowed one extra man for the concluding meet of the season.

San Pedro won the Class A Marine League title. Torrance placed second and Narbonne was third. It was reported this week by Coach Pete Zamperini: The Pirate Class B squad also took the league crown, with Narbonne second and Torrance third. Torrance captured the Class C championship, having never lost a dual meet. Class C contenders for Torrance will be entered in the All-City track prelims today and tomorrow in the L. A. Coliseum. The finals of this concluding meet of the year will be held June 13 in the Coliseum.

Season Opening Brings Bass Fishermen to Bixby Slough

Both salt and fresh-water fishing was available to local fishermen this week as the season on calico black bass and bluegill opened and crowds of anglers took positions around Bixby Slough waters. The slough was stocked last fall with bass and bluegill. Many catfish have been taken from the placid, reed-bordered waters in the past several years.

But it was not until this year that official seasonal fishing was instituted by the division of fish and game. Owners of the lake property were persuaded to declare the lake a public fishing area, making it possible for the state to stock the waters and regulate fishing there. Previous to then, the lake had no such status. To fish there now, a license is required.

The seasonal outlook here and throughout the state is considered good, according to wardens' reports. The slough area is known officially as district four and one-eighth.

Incidentally, the authorities said, the catfish season is the same as the bass season which closes Nov. 1.

Fishermen are employed by state authorities not to disturb nests of aquatic birds, mainly mudhens and teal, which make the slough their home.

The state authorities said the slough would probably be pretty well "fished out" before the end of the season.

Zamperini Grounded, Named Third Best U. S. Italian Athlete

To the National Civic League, Louis Zamperini, Torrance high graduate and former Trojan distance runner, is the third best Italian athlete in the nation. Membership of the organization is limited to persons of Italian ancestry. Anthony Comore of Creighton University was chosen as the best athlete with Vito Vitucci, Naval Academy grid star, as second.

Zamperini, who returned to his work at the Lockheed Aircraft plant recently after he was turned down by the Army Air Corps, is continuing his aeronautical studies in the hope of getting another chance to become a war-bird. He was recommended for advanced study by his instructors at the Hancock Aeronautical school in Santa Maria but the Army authorities rejected him because of "limited coordination," it was reported.

Dillon Shatters N.D. Track Mark

According to word received by his mother, Bill Dillon of Lomita, now a student at Notre Dame University, shattered the N. D. high hurdles record in a recent meet when he was timed in 14.6s. He also won the low hurdles the same afternoon. Dillon will appear in the final 1941 track meet at Notre Dame Saturday and then is expected to arrive home for vacation in about another week.

Indians Cop 11-Inning Game 4 to 3 Sunday

In an 11-inning ball game that was a thriller from the start, the Torrance Indians claimed a 4-3 victory over the U. S. Rubber Co. last Sunday at the Torrance city park diamond. Nick Palica's 11th-inning single, after Bill Hicks had gotten to first via a hit, proved the winning margin for the Indians.

The U. S. Rubbermen are the same crew that battled with the recent semi-pro Indians to a nine-inning 0-0 tie, thus breaking an Indian 13-game winning streak.

There will be a game Friday night, June 6, on Torrance diamond at 8 o'clock between the soldier boys of Fort MacArthur and the Torrance Indians. Sunday's double-header will be played with the L. A. Colored Athletics.
