354. This should be done at once, as we hope to file all petitions with the city clerk not later than Saturday of this week," he added.

Office Open Nights

It was discovered that the petition circulated by Ralph Watson could not be included in the official list as Watson had left for the East without turning in his petition or having the necessary affidavit affixed.

All those who have signed the Watson petition are urged by the Recall Committee to contact the headquarters, 1409 Marcellina avenue, so that arrangements may be made to have their signatures added to one of the valid petitions. If it is not convenient to call at the Recall Headquarters, a telephone call to 354 will bring an authorized petition circulator to your home, Mitschrich stated.

"If you are interested in good clean municipal government, you should lose no time in getting your signature on a valid petition. Our office will be open this evening and Friday evening until 9 p. m. for the convenience of all those who have not been contacted by our volunteer workers," Mitschrich pointed out.

Have Extra 15 Days

While he indicated that there probably would be sufficient signatures, even after discounting the ones on the Watson petition, Mitschrich said the Recall Committee wanted to have ample in reserve to offset any signatures that may be stricken off by the city clerk.

In the event the number of valid signatures, after checking by the city clerk, are found insufficient, the petitioners are allowed another 15 days to bring in additional names of qualified voters.

The Recall Committee is endeavoring to avoid this delay in holding the election by having an abundance of signatures on the first filing, which will be made this weekend.

Torrance Gets \$7,649 In Motor Vehicle Fees

The apportionment of \$9,653, 823.20 in motor vehicle license fees collected from July 1, 1940 to March 31, last, was announced yesterday by James M. Carter, director of motor vehicles.

Of the total, 20 percent, or \$1,931,746.64, was turned over to the general fund of the state. The remainder was apportioned 40 percent to the incorporated cities of the state and 40 percent to the counties on a basis of population.

Under the state law, the money must be used for street and road building purposes or for police and fire protection of the traffic thereon. Of the total apportioned, \$1,799,628 went to Los Angeles county and \$7,649.20 to Torrance.

The total net income from motor license fees for the period was \$14,018,254.92. Of this amount, however, \$4,359,431.72 was withheld to pay interest and principal on outstanding state highway bonds, contributions to the state retirement fund and support of the motor vehicle license tax administration. Carter said the amount collected is the largest in the state's history exceeding last year's figure by approximately \$2,283,000.

Harbor City Soldier Badly Injured In Automobile Accident

Reports from the hospital at Camp Ord, where Pvt. Robert Fenton was taken after receiving treatment at a Bakersfield hospital state that Fenton was more seriously injured than first reported, having head injuries, broken ribs, cuts, bruises and possible internal injuries, as well as losing several teeth.

Fenton, who had spent a weekend with his parents, left May 25 for Camp Ord with five other soldiers. Wm. Clayton, driver of the car, was instantly killed and the other five were injured when the machine was involved in an auto crash near Bakersfield. Fenton is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Fenton of 1679 257th st. He was acting corporal of the Mortar div., 32nd Infantry, having been at Camp Ord since Jan. 29. Clayton was from Los Angeles.

Latin America Looks To U. S. For Fiscal Aid

The probability that new loans and credits are to be added to the steadily mounting total already granted to Latin American governments by the United States is indicated by the disclosure in Washington that Colombia is seeking a substantial sum and by reports from Asuncion, Paraguay, that the Export-Import Bank may finance public works there.

The amount sought by Colombia has not been officially revealed, but reports from the Colombian capital place the sum at \$20,000,000.

Activities on the United States lending front have drawn attention anew to United States commercial and industrial penetration in Latin America, and to the possibilities for future all-out cooperation by the Latin American countries with the United States.

Indigent Camp at Alondra Park Said Only Temporary

In reply to protests sent the county board of supervisors against the proposed camp for county indigents at Alondra Park, County Manager Wayne R. Allen this week informed Secretary Pat MacDonnell of the Gardena Valley Chamber of Commerce that the camp, as authorized by the supervisors three weeks ago is to be temporary in character.

"The camp intended is purely a temporary project and in no sense will be considered a permanent venture," Allen wrote. "Please be assured that I am very sympathetic with the anxiety you have with regard to this matter, and I can assure you that there is no cause for uneasiness."

The Alondra Park assessment district, with county aid, is just completing the wiping out of a heavy Mattoon Act bond issue under which the park was purchased. Whether ownership of the park rests with the district or with the county now has not been determined, although its administration admittedly is under the county park department.

New Methods Give Defense Harder Steel

LOS ANGELES (U.P.)—The metal industry is keeping pace with the demands of the national defense program by perfecting new and better methods of fabricating the steel used in the manufacture of airplanes, tanks, battleships and guns.

Research scientists have developed superior processes for hardening surfaces of steel plates used in war armament and have discovered substitute alloys which are proving more efficient than metals previously used in war machinery.

Fire Damages Felker Plant

Damage estimated at \$500 was caused by a fire Saturday night at the Felker Manufacturing plant at 3521 Emerald ave.

Flames sputtered from a drawer in a work bench shortly after 10 p. m., it was reported. Damage was limited chiefly to smaller power machinery. The fire was checked by firemen in a 35-minute fight before the blaze reached nearby expensive heavy power equipment.

The Felker plant is currently manufacturing vacuum valves and diamond drills for a number of firms engaged in fabrication of national defense orders. The owner, Max Felker announced plans to build a new plant on Border ave. near Torrance Blvd.
