

Married Men and Those 28 Years Old Get Draft Deferment

Married men and those who have reached the age of 28 are now being deferred by Selective Service boards throughout the nation. The ruling on married men of draft age was announced early this week in Washington and the following telegram regarding 28-year-old draft registrants was received at Selective Service Board No. 280 in Torrance on July 1 from J. O. Donovan, state director:

"Bill to authorize deferment of men who have reached the age of 28 passed by Senate and is to be considered by House July 8. If enacted in its present

form will be retroactive to July 1. Any registrant who was 28 years of age or over on July 1 and has not been inducted at that date should be temporarily deferred. Those registrants who become 28 years of age after July 1 are not subject to deferment until July 1, 1942. Local boards should immediately stay induction of any registrant who was born on or prior to July 1, 1913. Any registrant born after that date is subject to induction at this time."
