Mrs. Leonard Young Fights Recallees on Husband's Status

tion concerning the Jain appointment and urged "in the interest of economy and sound judgment" that the action naming Jain purchasing agent as well as city engineer be rescinded. There was no comment from the council on the statement.

Mrs. Young told the council that neither she nor her husband had ever received any notice that Young was dismissed from city service; asserted that he was entitled, under Civil Service, to his salary for two years; that he had only received two weeks' full pay, two weeks' vacation pay and two weeks' at half-pay with the last check dated Nov. 16, 1940. She asserted she was more interested in retaining Young's title and Civil Service rating than the money.

Asked for his opinion on Young's status under Civil Service, City Attorney McCall said: "Mr. A. Beldon Gilbert, secretary of the California Peace Officers' Civil Service Association, believes Mr. Young was 'blanketed in' under our ordinance."

Murray in error
Jain told the council and Mrs. Young that "I don't care for the title of city engineer—I have always regarded Mr. Young as my superior and his desk is just as he left it when he was taken ill. All I want to see is some consideration for Mr. Young for whom I have the highest regard."

Regarding the payment of Young's salary, Powell declared: "This council did not authorize the two weeks at half-pay. If I remember right, the last full week's pay check had a notation on it that this is the final check," and "the legal authority vested in this council permits promoting any employee as it sees fit."

Murray, who persisted in interrupting Mrs. Young during her statements, announced that "the council appointed Jain only acting city engineer until Mr. Young recovers." The official minutes of the council meeting of June 26 do not endorse this statement.

Resolution Unnecessary
"Mrs. Young's story is all new to me," Councilman Hitchcock said, "I have heard rumors of it but I never knew before about the details. I think as Mrs. Young says, that if Leonard Young is under Civil Service we should give that due consideration. I think the resolution concerning Mr. Young is unnecessary."

Mayor McGuire asked Powell to withhold his resolution concerning Young until after the city attorney presents his opinion. Murray also asked McCall to bring in a report on "whether the city can continue to pay Young" and Babcock asked the city clerk to "check up and see how long former employees taken ill were paid and also bring in the cancelled vouchers paid to Mr. Frank Leonard if they are available."
