Arizona Vicar Will Conduct Services Here



Care Should be Taken In Marking Ballots

Voters favoring the recall of Councilmen Powell, Murray and Babcock were cautioned this week by the Citizens' Committee for Good Government that in order to have their votes count against all three recallers it would be necessary to stamp their ballots in THREE PLACES, in the "Yes" column opposite EACH of the three councilmen's names.
The Citizens' Committee also strongly urged that voters designate that the vacancies should be filled "BY SPECIAL ELECTION."
Unless the majority of voters favor a "special election" it will be necessary, under California Law for the City Council to fill the vacancies by appointment; and because the recallers hold their offices until their successors qualify, Powell, Murray and Babcock could, even after being recalled, select their own successors as they have a majority on the council. No sensible person desires any such result, it was pointed out.

Torrance Herald
Within the last few days a tabloid "paper" was surreptitiously circulated in Torrance containing scurrilous statements. Under the cover of anonymity (neither the name of the scribe nor the publisher is given) various broad innuendoes are sought to be conveyed relative to the undersigned. It also contained certain inferences and libelous statements. I would appreciate it if you would allow me brief space in The Herald for this communication by way of reply.

1st. The paternal ancestor who founded my family in America was Edward Bumpus who came to Plymouth Rock in the ship Fortune in 1621. (See the Directory of Ancestral Heads of New England Families, 1620-1700. Also the First U. S. Census.) He afterwards removed to Marshfield and in 1652 was a proprietor of Dartmouth, The Massachusetts "Record of the Soldiers and Sailors of the Revolution" contains a long list of descendants of Edward. The line is clear to Samuel, who served in the Union Army as an officer. Samuel's son was George who was my father.

I have a number of relatives of the same name in Los Angeles, Beverly Hills, and Pasadena.

2nd. I was admitted to practice law in 1925 in all the courts of the State of California, including the Federal Courts. I am still on the roll of the Supreme Court. I am still engaged in the practice of the law.

3rd. The name George was a present from my father. One of my three sons is named George. The middle name, Marlow, was given me by my mother who is related to one Christopher Marlowe who lived in Elizabethan England.

4th. I have been a resident of the City of Torrance "in the last two years" and I still am such a resident.

5th. As the father of a family of five I think I have a considerable stake in the welfare of the community and particularly in ridding the city government of incompetent office holders who for some obscure reason as yet unknown, so greatly fear the loss of their employment as public servants that they resort to tactics so reprehensible that even they are ashamed publicly to avow them. This statement is made principally in relation to my professional standing; I am not a candidate for any of the offices which the three discredited councilmen are so frantically seeking to retain.

Open Verdict in Crash Death of Mrs. J.C. Smith

After two witnesses had testified, a coroner's jury returned an open verdict in the traffic death July 15 of Mrs. Rose Page Smith, wife of J. C. Smith, following investigation at Stone and Myers' chapel last Thursday afternoon. The jury held that the fatality was accidental and declined to fix responsibility.

Deputy Sheriff Jack Caldwell and Mrs. Ruth E. Walters testified. The driver of the other car involved in the collision at Redondo Beach Blvd. and Prairie ave., Paul D. Melbach, 27, of Redondo Beach, refused to testify on the advice of his counsel.

Many friends of Mrs. Smith and her husband, well-known pianist and actor, attended the funeral service held Saturday afternoon at Stone and Myers with Rev. H. Wesley Roloff officiating. Interment was at Inglewood Mausoleum.

Members of the jury investigating the collision were Charles H. Law, Everett H. Grubbs, P. B. Clayton, Albert H. Severson, and Rev. Harry Branton. J. Pearce Kane, deputy county coroner, was in charge of the inquest.
