County Valuation Shows Huge Gain; May Reduce Tax

The gain of more than \$92,000,000 in the total assessed valuation of all real estate, improvements and personal property in Los Angeles county, as announced late last week, may make it possible to reduce the general county tax levy about one cent for local residents it appeared this week. Valuations were not announced for the 126-odd school districts, but trustees were endeavoring to obtain them to estimate what school taxes would amount to this year. Real estate dropped \$47,880,000 this year over last year and about one-third of this was due to oil fields playing out, according to Assistant Assessor John Hartman. Business property in Hollywood and downtown Los Angeles also was said to be below last year.

Gains Itemized All of the new building that has been under way the past year caused the assessor to increase the figure on improvements by \$64,900,000 over last year. This represented practically \$128,000,000 in new building construction. Personal property this year showed a net gain of \$75,000,000, on top of a gain of nearly \$19,000,000 a year ago. House furnishings for thousands of new homes are one of the principal reasons for this increase.

Land valuations dropped some \$60,000,000 last year, which with another \$47,000,000 this year makes well over \$100,000,000 in the last two years. Los Angeles city had a drop of around \$60,000,000 in total valuation last year, most of which was due to downtown real estate, but this year the city's total valuation is up by \$27,000,000.

LIVERPOOL—(U. P.)—Writing a letter to her sweetheart as bombs were falling all around her house, a girl described the last moments of five persons. It is believed that a few minutes after she had put her pen aside a bomb fell on the house, killing her, her father, mother, aunt and a friend.

"The warning has just gone and the guns are going. I wish you were here with me. Every time they dive I go sick inside. I am going to read your letter and see if it will give me a bit of luck."

The letter went on to tell of the crump of bombs falling nearby, and concluded: "I am now lying under the table. We just had an incendiary bomb in the yard. My hand is shaking."
