

Newton, Walteria Newsman, Enters Race for Council

over-run Europe. "I do not believe in closed circle rule," he continued. "I wish to see Torrance municipal affairs taken out of the hands of a clique or cliques and put back in the hands of the people. I am not interested in the merits of the fights that have been and are being carried on. I am not interested in giving any of the people involved another black eye."

"I've been looking into the sorry mess and I have come to one conclusion -- and only one. The squabbles, bickering, blood-letting and manifestations of rivalry and jealousy should be stopped. I am interested in seeing them stopped only as a taxpayer, husband and father; as a resident of the city who hopes to live here for years to come and send his child to school and enjoy the things taxes should buy without having to pay twice for them and then probably never get them."

Wants Walteria Projects "I am told the trouble started over Judge Lessing; then others say it was over city financing of the Chamber of Commerce. Again, I am informed, it was over whether the council should run city affairs by resolution or by ordinance. If I become a councilman I will insist on careful handling of such matters. Grave mistakes have been made on all sides. In the employ of the people to help administer the affairs of the city, I would be humble enough to ask the honest opinion of the people on such matters and hope I would never find it advisable to conceal anything from them."

Torrance's reputation to its neighbor cities should be strengthened and it should realize it has a share in the riches of Los Angeles county. I want Walteria put on a basis commensurate with the taxes it pays and that district given a few street improvements, a library building and the promised recreation center. I would like to see city employees in the lower wage brackets put on a higher scale to meet rising living costs.

Raps "Machine" Politics "I am not certain that two men selected in a public session of 'representative' citizens the night of Aug. 6 are 'people's candidates.' I know of no neighbor of mine who was informed such a meeting was to take place. They were selected at a meeting in the Chamber of Commerce which has been party to the series of squabbles in Torrance, and knowing political manipulations as I do, I am not certain they weren't railroaded into candidacy before the majority of us had a chance to select a candidate. In short, a machine put them out in front."

"I hope the people will recognize their own interest -- human interest -- in this election. I want my neighbors to enjoy their investment in Torrance. I hope Torrance can find better free lance material than myself, for this reason, and that such a candidate will beat me. I hope no machine-sponsored candidate will win."

"As a newsman I've seen too many political outbreaks. In short, however it is brought about, I hope the present machine is soon thrown out of gear. I wish to be able to welcome new citizens to a politically renovated city. I think a Walteria man should be in the race. If they don't like me at the end of the short term or I don't like the office, my tenure can easily be terminated. May the best independent man win!" Newton concluded.

Both made similar statements separately then that tallied.

From information obtained and from records of similar "petting-party" holdups during the past few months, authorities believe they have at last found the leaders of a robbery gang. Tarpley is only recently out of the county jail where he was confined for hold-ups in Anaheim and Harbor City.

at the Greene hog ranch early in July, two men got away when Gipson, his brother and Keith Wright were caught. The two who fled may have been Hinds and Tarpley, according to Police Chief Stroth.
