### SCHOOL TAX UP 12 CENTS TO \$1.91

Indignant over increased tax rates, many local citizens continued to voice protest this week against the record-smashing school budget of \$44,437,342 adopted by the Los Angeles board of education for 1941-42. This budget will require a tax rate of approximately \$1.91 per \$100 assessed valuation, an increase of 12 cents over last year and 11 cents above the previous peak of 1939-40.

Although the budget for the current year is only \$952,667 higher than last year's, taxpayers actually must furnish \$1,674,978 more due to decreased revenues from other channels. The school board adopted the all-time high budget by a five-to-two vote, Drs. Clarence W. Pierce and E. Vincent Askey protesting that a \$244,163 item for salaries through reclassification of personnel should be lopped off.

### GARDENA TAX RATE BOOSTED TO \$1

For the first time in the history of Gardena, property owners in that city will pay a \$1 tax rate to meet a budget of \$22,970.15 for 1941-42 expenditures. Previously, the Gardena tax rate has never been higher than 90 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. Taxpayers of that community are finding some consolation, however, in the fact that Los Angeles city property owners will pay approximately 75 per cent more, and also in the fact that there will be no more special assessments for Alondra Park.

### REDONDO RATE \$2.02

Tax rate for Redondo Beach for the fiscal year 1941-42 was set at \$2.02 per \$100 assessed valuation in Tax District No. 1 and \$1.70 for District No. 2, which comprises North Redondo Beach.
