

Harbor District Plan for Port Covers County

Reaction of taxpayers outside the cities of Los Angeles and Long Beach to a proposal that would create a county-wide harbor district for operation of the county's two commercial harbors was being awaited today at the Hall of Records.

Chairman Roger Jessup proposed at Tuesday's meeting of the board of supervisors that a county-wide harbor district be created, which would spread the tax burden for operation of the harbors among all of the county's taxpayers, instead of it being shouldered by Los Angeles city and Long Beach city taxpayers.

Several years ago the supervisors spread the cost of maintaining drainage district among the taxpayers of the flood control district, whereas it had been borne by taxpayers within the immediate area supposed to have been benefited. The flood control district does not take in quite all of the county, excluding Antelope valley.

Follows Jessup's Proposal
 Jessup's resolution was referred to the board's committee of the whole. In it, he asked the board members to pledge the county's cooperation in promoting the formation of the district and it calls upon the county counsel to render legal assistance to any representative group seeking to accomplish the formation of such a district.

Several months ago a proposal was advanced to form a harbor district embracing all of West Los Angeles, Beverly Hills, most of Hollywood and the area west of Western avenue and south to include Inglewood. Aim of this was to improve an inner harbor immediately north of the Ballona creek outlet at Playa Del Rey for a yacht harbor.

This proposal has been continued from time to time by the board, following extended arguments from both proponents and opponents of the plan.
