Joe Hagberg of 24211 Neece ave., informed the council that a study of city ordinances reveal that the only one pertaining to the keeping of poultry, goats, horses and cows in residential districts (none within 100 feet of a residence) had been repealed and a newer ordinance made no provision for relief of this kind.

J. W. Loughridge of the Walteria Civic Organization also asked for some relief from asserted unsanitary conditions in his district. He was informed by Mayor Tom McGuire that the county sanitation inspector would be asked to investigate and give a recommendation to the city council.

Naval Academy Sought for West

California Congressmen who already have introduced bills calling for establishment of a naval academy branch on the west coast added another bill late last week which would authorize expenditure of \$10,000,000 for such an institution in Southern California.

Rep. Harry R. Sheppard (D) introduced the measure and other Californians supporting the bill said they believe the long-sought "Annapolis of the West" has a better chance of being approved this session than ever before because of the defense emergency.

Children No Longer Required of Renters At Housing Project

Availability of one-bedroom apartments for couples without children at the 300-unit Harbor Hills low-rent housing project was announced today by Ray Y. Copelin, projects manager of the County Housing Authority.

A resolution passed by the Authority and approved by the United States Housing Authority requires that families with children be given preference in renting apartments. Other requirements, however, give the Authority power to rent apartments to couples where a need is shown to exist.

Several one-bedroom apartments are available at the Harbor Hills Project in the Palms Verdes Hills. Couples will pay between \$16 and \$23 a month, depending on the family's income. Besides the single units, there are two and three-bedroom apartments available. The project has been open for occupancy only since July 12 and is slightly less than half full now.

Governor Proclaims Fire Prevention Week October 5 to 11

Gov. Culbert Olson has proclaimed the week Oct. 5 to 11 as Fire Prevention week in California and called upon citizens to lend their best efforts to this worthwhile campaign to reduce the losses by fire in this state.

"The industrial, agricultural and economic resources of the entire nation are being mobilized at this time in a stupendous program for national defense," the proclamation said. "Destruction of the productive facilities of the nation are equally as serious at this time as in the event of actual warfare."

"Fire has annually destroyed a substantial percentage of the wealth of this nation, thus retarding the industrial development of many communities and inflicting a tremendous burden upon individuals and an even more serious loss of life. "It is hoped that by centering the attention of the general public upon the widespread losses incurred as a result of preventable fires, that it will be possible to materially reduce the cost in life and property."

Thanksgiving Day Fixed for November 20

Gov. Culbert Olson has announced he will designate Nov. 20 as Thanksgiving Day in California this year, following the announced intention of President Roosevelt in fixing the day.

The 20th is the next to last Thursday of the month, rather than the final Thursday. However, the president has said that in future years he will return to the custom of designating the last Thursday as Thanksgiving. He said that the old date would have been designated this year, but for prior commitments of retailers, calendar makers and other affected businesses.




