Work Done by Red Cross Told Lomita Group

At the meeting of the Red Cross Monday night there was a small attendance but those present had a most worthwhile evening. Bowen McCoy, manager of the Los Angeles Chapter of Red Cross, was the speaker. He gave a comprehensive and instructive talk of what has been done and what has to be done in regard to Civil Defense. Important phases discussed were the need for First Aid Courses, importance of Nurses' Aid Corps, special production services for our own men in the Army and Navy, preparation for canteen and motor corps, nutrition classes and disaster relief service.

In speaking of civil defense, McCoy said that in order to get an organization that would function properly there were two distinct councils, the State Civil Defense and the County Defense Council, the latter including all territory not incorporated.

Short on instructors. He explained the setup of the Sheriff's offices for organization of communities on a co-operative plan to function in case of disaster, placing responsibility for food, clothing, canteens, motor corps, etc., in the hands of chairmen in each district. Nutrition classes are going well and probably 3,500 women will be ready for diplomas by the close of the year.

The most serious shortage was for First Aid instructors who were qualified to teach classes during the day. He made the suggestion that women's organizations desiring instruction in either, First Aid, Standard and advanced courses send some of their members to First Aid instructor classes and so prepare their own instructors.

McCoy warned against confusion and stated that the Red Cross was training workers and working with but two ideas, disaster preparedness and disaster relief. Mrs. Rose Connolly, the branch organizer, was also a visitor at Monday's meeting.

Western Link Completion Near

County supervised SRA road crews are completing final work on the Canyon Drive extension of Western ave., from Hillcrest ave., to Anaheim street and the roadway should be opened to traffic within two weeks, according to O. F. Cooley, county road commissioner.

Fine grading of the stretch is being completed and black top surfacing shortly will be rolled. County Road Engineer Charles E. Richie is supervising 20 SRA workers assigned to complete the \$21,000 project which was stalled for a time this summer when WPA labor was withdrawn under the nation-wide curtailment of WPA projects.

From a point 400 feet south of Hillcrest, the link being constructed will sweep diagonally northeast to Anaheim street.


