COUNTY ORDERS START ON TWO DRAIN SECTIONS

A bid of \$52,883 won for the Morrison-Knudsen Co., of Los Angeles the contract Tuesday for building a new Laguna Dominguez channel from Rosecrans Blvd., to Redondo Beach Road.

At the same time the Board of Supervisors instructed County Flood Control Engineer H. E. Hedger to proceed with his own crew and equipment to extend the Dominguez channel south-west toward Long Beach from Redondo Beach Blvd., to Arlington ave. The cost of this work will be \$33,000. Both jobs are part of the Nigger Slough drainage program.

At the southerly end of the Laguna Dominguez project county crews have been busy for weeks dredging the channel at the Carson st., crossing, and large culverts are to be installed south in the vicinity of 223rd st. Dirt removed from the channel is being banked high on either side as further prevention against flooding.

Volunteers Ask Monthly Salary

Declaring their pay of \$2.50 per fire call and \$1 per drill was inadequate, nine volunteer firemen assigned to the central fire station appealed to the city council Monday night for a flat guaranteed minimum salary of \$10 per month each.

They stated that the guaranteed sum would provide "more equitable compensation." The volunteers must furnish their own turn-out uniforms and while they are subject to call at any alarm, they assert regular paid firemen are attempting to answer all calls without summoning the volunteers.

The request was referred to the Police and Fire committee of the city council for a report at the next municipal board session on Oct. 28.
