

"Take heed, brethren, lest there be in any of you an evil heart of unbelief, in departing from the living God. But exhort one another daily, while it is called 'day.' These words of Paul to the Hebrews are the Golden Text in the Lesson-Sermon on "Prohibition after Death" on Sunday in all Churches of Christ, Scientist.

Scriptural selections include this verse from Romans: "The night is far spent, the day is at hand: let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light." And from Proverbs: "In the way of righteousness is life; and in the pathway thereof there is no death." "Hear, O my son, and receive my sayings; and the years of thy life shall be many. . . . Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life. . . . Ponder the path of thy feet, and let all thy ways be established."

The Lesson-Sermon presents also these statements from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "The discoverer of Christian Science finds the path less difficult when she has the high goal always before her thoughts, than when she counts her footsteps in endeavoring to reach it. When the destination is desirable, expectation speeds our progress. The struggle for Truth makes one strong instead of weak, resting instead of wearying one."

Ford-TWA Meteorite Expedition Finds Evidence of New Caverns



EXPEDITION IN ACTION . . . On the Northern Arizona plateau near Winslow, a Ford-T. W. A. meteorite survey expedition last week uncovered evidence that huge subterranean caverns, rivaling world-famous Carlsbad Caverns in size and beauty, still exist. The expedition headed by Dr. Harvey H. Nininger, world-famed meteorite authority, originally was drawn to the scene where the Southwest's greatest scenic discovery in years may soon be made, to explore 32 newly-discovered craters for possible valuable deposits of meteoritic nickel and iron. Top to Bottom—Scientists declare the new craters, some of which are visible in this aerial view, were caused when a terrific earthquake, started by the fall of a huge meteorite 45 miles distant, collapsed the rock roofs of the caverns in their weakest points. . . . Ground exploration of the jagged pits, which are as much as 500 feet wide and 300 feet deep, indicated they were formed 20,000 to 30,000 years ago. Most of the underground chambers are still intact. It is believed, and exploratory operations for openings are already planned. . . . Ford passenger cars and station wagons, called upon to transport the expedition across the rough Arizona plain where there frequently were no roads, wind along the brink of Chevalon Canyon, in which Dr. Nininger declares openings to the long-hidden caverns will be found. . . . In this huge crater, 4,000 feet wide and originally 1,400 feet deep, lies the ten million ton meteoritic mass which scientists believe killed every living being within at least 50 miles upon its impact. More than one-half million dollars has been spent in unsuccessful attempts to mine commercially the estimated \$300,000,000 in metals buried in Meteor Crater.
