**Yule Decoration Plan Making Good Progress**

To guarantee authenticity of the miniature buildings, Dale Riley, city recreation director, conferred with M. Graf, aide to the Swiss consul in Los Angeles, Tuesday regarding the architecture of the Swiss structures which will be located in El Prado Park as part of the community Christmas decoration program.

Riley was given much information by Graf on Swiss building styles and is now using the data in the City Recreation Center on Arlington ave. where construction of the replicas is already under way. He expects to have eight of the model structures completed in time for the opening of the community Yuletide celebration about Dec. 1.

In the meantime, a conference has been arranged between the members of Torrance Business Men's Association, Principal Thomas E. Eason and Mrs. Marjorie Eischen Cooke, high school music director, regarding the participation of student singers in a carol-singing program.

**Big Lighting Job**  
And Oscar Butterfield, city electrician, has completed plans for the illumination of El Prado Park with more than 4,200 colored lights. This will provide a Yuletide setting of exceptional beauty, he believes, for the Swiss Village and the proposed march of carolers several nights early in December down through the park from the high school steps to Cravens avenue and return.

The city will have to purchase, approximately 4,000 or more extra globes to properly illuminate the park trees and extend streamers of light at 40-foot intervals across the park from Cravens to the high school. Butterfield says he wants to get started on the wiring job as soon as possible because it will be the largest ever undertaken by his department.

Similar lighting will outline El Prado from Cravens to the Pacific Electric station. The city is also expected to purchase a huge neon star that may be erected on top of the high school building in the exact center of El Prado park, permission is obtained from school authorities.

**Council Pledges Aid**  
Dr. Otto Wartenweiler, the Consul of Switzerland in Los Angeles, has been informed of the city's Christmas project and has expressed his keen interest in the Swiss Village idea. He has assured representatives of the city that "the consulate will assist you as much as possible." Dr. Wartenweiler suggested the name of a competent Swiss architect to go over the plans for the buildings.

However, in his conference with M. Graf at the consular office, Riley learned that his research into Swiss architecture was authentic and his plans were approved in all details.

**COUNCIL VOTES YULE DECORATION FUNDS**  
At the adjourned meeting of the city council Tuesday night, the following appropriations to carry out the proposed community Christmas program were approved: \$111.61 for material requested by the City Recreation department to be used in construction of the model Swiss Village; \$147.30 for 1,000 additional Christmas light sockets; \$241.77 for 1,320 additional colored light globes, and \$25 per month to Oscar Butterfield, city electrician, for the use of his private car during the Christmas decoration work.

The activities of the Chamber of Commerce are being reorganized by a board of 15 directors chosen by the membership. Similar set-ups are operating in San Pedro and Compton, Sears added.

President Sears briefly reviewed the events leading up to the present stalemate of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, which came to a crisis when the city council some two months ago withdrew further financial support out of tax monies. He frankly admitted the lack of confidence by a large part of the local citizenry and stated that in his opinion the Chamber could not operate effectively under the present set-up. He asked what action the membership wished to take.

Director Max N. Felker, seconded by Director A. H. Silligo, moved that the present Chamber organization be disbanded and the corporation be dissolved.

However, in the discussion which followed, it was brought out that expense of re-incorporating a new body could be saved by amending present articles of incorporation and by-laws to conform to desires of the re-organized body.

All present Chamber officers and directors indicated that they would resign to make way for election of an entire new governing board. It was then decided to adopt a substitute motion, which called for appointment of a committee of three by President Sears, whose task it will be to contact various groups throughout the community and invite them to send delegates to a conference for drafting a new plan of operation.

Pending adoption of the new set-up, the Chamber will be operated by the present board of directors and personnel.

The last arrivals from Midway left the island aboard a Navy freighter, the U. S. S. Sirius, on Oct. 15. They were six days sailing to Honolulu and after six more days there, embarked for a seven-day voyage to Alameda near San Francisco.
