

# Gauchos at S. P. Tomorrow for Feature Game; Torrance at Banning

## Narbonne Hopes to Retain League Lead

Determined to hold their lead on league standings, Narbonne's Gauchos travel to San Pedro tomorrow afternoon to take on the Pirates while the Torrance Tartars also take to the road, going to Wilmington for a game with the Banning Pilots. The Gauchos-Pirates melee holds no interest in the Marine League because San Pedro is defending titleholder and the Narbonnians should be in top condition. Gardena, smarting under three league defeats, gets a week off to prepare its Mohicans for tackling San Pedro Nov. 14.

Coach Bill Sloan's Gauchos, victors over Gardena and Banning, will remember the wild game with San Pedro last year—and how their 13-point lead was overcome and passed by the Pirates who rolled up 32 points to win. Sloan has been bringing his squad along gradually, despite a poor pre-season showing and the Lomitanis should be in top form for the Friday battle.

Bill Gibson, star Gaucho end, is expected to see action and Rolfe Justice, who has been on the sick list, should be able to go the route if necessary.

The Torrance-Banning tilt on the Pilots' own field is rated as a toss-up with the Tartars holding an edge. Coach Bob Barr's squad came out of the Gardena fracas last week in good condition and with the aid of Bill Parton should be able to down Banning for the third time in four years' competition.

Joe Chulka, first line reserve for Andy Sulch who already was on the bench from injuries, was also taken from the contest but his hurts are healed now.

San Pedro scored in the second quarter when Jack Sampson third string halfback ran 17 yards around and after tossing 22 and six yards. Cathedral scored its safety and Teel was injured in the third quarter after the visitors reached the Pirate 12-inch line. Holding for four downs from the four-yard marker, the Pirates took over on the one-foot line and Teel's attempt to kick was blocked and he was injured.

## New Scout Director In Harbor District

W. E. "Ted" Robison has been appointed district executive of the Harbor District by Scout Executive Ernest E. Voss of the Los Angeles Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America. The Harbor District is made up of Torrance, Gardena, Hermosa Beach, Lomita, Manhattan Beach, Palos Verdes, Redondo Beach, Rolling Hills, San Pedro and Wilmington.

At the present time there are 48 Troops, Packs, and Sea Scout Ships with total enrollment of 1,194 Cubs, Scouts and Sea Scouts.

"Most of our Troops, Packs, and Ships," stated Robison, "are well organized and doing good scouting. Some have had breakdowns in sponsoring or leadership. These we will immediately re-organize where conditions are favorable. New units are being organized and training is under way for the leaders. We want to be quite sure that when a boy joins he will get scouting."

Robison was formerly Scout Executive of the Imperial-Yuma Council. His last assignment in the Los Angeles Area Council was in the San Antonio area. In the last four years this area increased from 60 units to 118, and membership from 1,400 to 2,700. He takes the place of Gene Weston who now has the central of downtown Los Angeles district.



last Friday afternoon they gave the Torrance Tartars their first grid victory of the Marine League season. The star guard of Coach Bob Barr's football team booted a conversion point that defeated Gardena 7 to 6.

Torrance rooters staged an impromptu parade all the way from Gardena's field to and around the business and residential district here in celebration. They were entitled to the victory observance because Tartar grid wins are few and far between. The Gardena decision was the Tartars' first win since they beat Banning Nov. 13 last year and their second since Torrance downed Narbonne 19 to 12 back in 1938.

After three quarters of evenly-matched and scoreless football, featured only by Bill Parton's 72-yard touchdown run that was nullified by a "off-side" penalty on Torrance in the second period, Gardena's Ken Wagner went five yards around end for a touchdown in the early moments of the final chapter. But Gardena failed to convert.

**Both Teams Evenly Matched**  
The Tartars and Mohicans went at it again with Bob Golden heaving passes. One of his aerials was nabbed by Parton after 30 yards and the receiver went another 12 to the promised land. Then Dave Jacobs went in to boot and he made himself a hero by toeing the ball smack between the goal standards.

Torrance and Gardena were as evenly matched as any teams could possibly be—take a look at the "yardstick" for confirmation of this in regard to first downs, yardage gained on kicks and running plays. ## Gauchos Defeat Banning; Take League Lead

Narbonne's Gauchos served notice on the Marine League last Friday afternoon when they beat Banning 12 to 6 that they are going to be reckoned with when the 1941 grid title is awarded. The Lomitanis won from the Pilots by one touchdown—but that's not the whole story of a game that was featured by some of the finest football yet staged in this district. And if the 4:45 stop rule had not been evoked, the Gauchos may have had to be content with a tie.

The Pilots were on the Gaucho 10-yard stripe with a first down when the game was abruptly halted by the board of education's master-minds and their stupid "sundown" ruling. This was the second time Narbonne has finished a game with only a narrow margin and had that shrinking when the gun sounded, Gardena was challenging the Lomitanis' lead on the Narbonne five when the clock reached 4:45 on October 24.

However, the Gauchos last Friday put the Pilots through a severe lacing. Not until the third quarter could Banning get inside the Narbonne 50-yard stripe and only three plays before the end of the first half the Pilots scored their first down. Narbonne collected 12 first downs against six for Banning had a big edge in yardage gained.

Alexander Travels Banning managed to revive in the final quarter to march 80 yards to score. Except for three or four fumbles, Coach Bill Sloan's outfit might have doubted the score. Twice mistakes were recovered in Gaucho territory. The first fumble gave the Pilots possession for the first time inside the 50.

Rolle Justice provided the winning margin for Narbonne when he made a diving catch of Alexander's fourth down 30-yard pass. Because the toss was erratic, Justice dove with outstretched arms, catching the ball after landing on the ground in the end zone. Previously, Leroy Crow had scored from the one-yard marker to top a second quarter Narbonne drive.

Alexander, Narbonne's ace tailback, made most of the Gaucho yardage while he received some big league blocking from Cheek and Crow. The Gauchos played without their stellar end, Bill Gibson and Justice was able to play only a short while. Lineups:
