### Aerosedan Plays Important Role In Duck-hunting Trip.

With Southland duck-hunters reporting one of the most sporting and successful seasons in years, famous Southern California haunts of Canvas-back, Blue Wing and Mallard are now reverberating to the bark of shotguns. Taking advantage of the ideal conditions, a 1942 Fleetline Chevrolet scouting party recently made the pleasant trip to the Big Bear Lake area—approximately one hundred miles from Los Angeles and known as one of the state's richest regions—returned with attractive Thanksgiving Day dinners.

### Another Milk Increase Fought

Attorneys for three large milk distributors and for a group of protestants prepared to sum up their arguments for and against an increase of another one-half cent in the price of milk, in briefs requested by the state department of agriculture this week.


Oral argument on the proposal ended late last week. The distributors ask an increase from 23 to 24½ cents a half-gallon bottle in stores and from 24½ to 26 cents on home deliveries. No boost was asked for quarts, although quarts now sell 62½ per cent higher than in July of 1940, it was stated.

Stanley Mullen, appealing on behalf of small dairies, said they faced the possibility of being forced out of business by increased production costs. Six price increases of one-half cent already have been granted in most sections of the county, however.

### Patrol Station Approved as Red Cross First Aid Station

The Lucas Patrol station has been approved by Director Gordon of the Red Cross First Aid as a First Aid station. The seven members of the local force have all passed standard first aid tests. Necessary equipment will be installed shortly.

At the regular meeting of Lomita Red Cross on Monday Nov. 10 it was suggested that due to a great shortage in First Aid Instructors, an effort was being made to arrange for First Aid Courses, both standard and advanced for Torrance, Lomita and Gardena in joint sessions.

Registrations for Lomita are being taken at Narbonne Ranch Water Co. No. 2, Mrs. Marie Le-Pont, who has been one of the most active workers in Lomita Red Cross, is now taking the Volunteer Relief course. She has been appointed with Frank Andrews to make a survey of the amount of available equipment such as cots, blankets, etc., to be had in case of disaster.

Mrs. Chas. Smith, production chairman, has about 30 sweaters ready to turn in soon and she hopes to have 50 by Christmas. More knitters are responding to the call. She has requested fraternal organizations and club organizations to give one day a month to supervising the sewing room.

The sewing room is open on Mondays and Thursdays from 1

to 4 p.m., at Lomita Elementary school and in addition to the sewing done there is work to be counted and packed. Work is also given out to be done at home.
