Students Having Teeth Examined

The entire graduating class at Torrance high school has been examined by Dr. Sellwood, Los Angeles city school dentist at his office, consisting of a trailer stationed in the yard of the Torrance Elementary school.

Dr. Sellwood has been working in Torrance for the past four weeks. During this time he has examined a large number of boys and girls from the Elementary and high school. Many boys and girls have learned that they need dental attention and have arranged with their own dentists to have their teeth repaired.

Much of the benefit of the dentist's examination consists of his advice regarding the care of the teeth. The lesson includes the story of 200,000 draftees, who were found unfit for military service because their teeth were so badly neglected.

Serious conditions leading to the loss of permanent teeth may be corrected by more frequent visits to the dentist. Dr. Sellwood urges parents to take their children to their own dentists for examinations, preferably twice a year.
