

Council Names Ward Bus Head As Two Apply

After hearing letters of application for jobs as manager of the Torrance Municipal Bus system from James A. Evans, 1322 Sartori ave., and John H. Gish, Long Beach, the city council Tuesday night adopted a resolution appointing C. Z. Ward temporary manager of the system. Ward has been serving in that capacity since L. J. Gilmeister was dismissed several months ago.

In his application, Gish stated he had previous bus direction experience in Kansas, Pennsylvania and Ohio and is at present employed as station manager of a bus line in San Pedro. He wanted \$250 a month salary if employed by Torrance. Evans cited the present monthly deficit of the municipal line and outlined methods whereby additional revenue could be secured. Both applications were filed.

At the same meeting the council authorized Mayor Tom McGuire to sign a contract with the Goodrich Tire Co., for bus tires providing the agreement is approved by Glenn Jain, city purchasing agent. The sum of \$100 was appropriated to buy miscellaneous repair parts for the buses from the city of Santa Monica.

28 Take Radio Operating Tests

Hunched over desks and cudgeling their brains for all they were worth, 28 police and firemen today took examinations in the council chamber of the city hall for commercial radio operator's licenses. The test is the climax of several months of "book work" for the badge-bearers and smoke-eaters who were attempting to qualify to operate the new two-way police radio transmitter which has been installed in the police station.

Those who fail in the test cannot take another for 60 days and in case they are policemen, Police Chief John Stroh has promised to put the failures to "walking a beat" instead of riding in squad cars and operating the radio system. Preliminary tests of the 60 watt transmitter indicate that it will function perfectly. As yet, however, no field test has been made so Chief Stroh does not know if there are any "blind spots" in the city where aerial communication will be impossible.
