Discrimination Charge By City Union Denied By Councilmen Here

Charging that "certain local employees of the city" have been "discriminated against because of union activity," Local 128, the National Supply unit of the Oil Workers' International Union, informed the city council on Dec. 23, that it gave full support to the Employees' Association of Torrance No. 128, an affiliate of the C. I. O. The Oil Workers urged the council to adopt a resolution to be submitted to the city workers' local and the communication was signed by John T. Pierce, unit secretary.

However, City Clerk A. H. Bartlett reported he had received no resolution from the city C. I. O. group and various members of the council declared they know of no discrimination. Jack Hallager, president of the Torrance City Employees Association, an independent organization declared his group was not involved in this matter. The C.I.O. organization is a local of the State, County and Municipal Employees Association, he said.

Japanese Recovering After Shotgun Attack; Stepson is Held

No new angles have developed in the shotgun shooting of Satoru Okada, 45, Redondo Beach truck salesman, whose stepson, Shigato J. Okada, 20, was arrested Dec. 26 by deputy sheriffs and held in connection with the attempted slaying.

The victim, a patient at Torrance Memorial hospital, had a setback last Thursday as the result of wounds received in his back from No. 7 shotgun slugs but today he is reported recovering.

Redondo Beach police said the young Okada confessed the shooting at the Okada home, 2229 Manhattan Beach Boulevard Redondo Beach.

Tsu Fujimoto, 28, arrested with Okada, is accused of having driven the automobile in which Okada fled from the scene after the shooting, which occurred at the back door of the Okada home. The shooting, he told police, resulted from a family quarrel.

Mrs. Whiting's Funeral Rites Are Wednesday

The death of Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Whiting of 1719 Arlington ave., Dec. 27 at Torrance Memorial hospital left her four children homeless—her husband, Sanford Albert Whiting is stationed on Johnson Island in the South Pacific where he is engaged in building a Pacific air base.

Mrs. Whiting, who was 48 years of age, had been confined at the hospital for five days before her death. She and her husband came to Torrance 19 years ago shortly after their marriage. She was a native of Pennsylvania.

The children are sons Frank S. and George A., and daughters, Eileen and Dorothy. Three brothers in Philadelphia and two sisters in the east also survive.

The Rosary will be recited in her honor tonight (Tuesday) at 8 o'clock at Stone and Myers' chapel and funeral Mass will be conducted at the Catholic Church of the Nativity tomorrow (Wednesday) morning at 9 o'clock by Rev. Father Joseph L. Bauer. Interment will be at Holy Cross cemetery.

Local Resident Takes Own Life Christmas Day at His Home

The body of Joseph H. McGovern, 59, was found Christmas Day in a room at his home, 2349 233rd st., a .22 calibre rifle bullet through the head, according to Torrance police reports.

L. P. Johnson of 2131 233rd st., called by Mrs. McGovern after she had found the body of her husband, summoned police. The body was taken to the Stone and Myers mortuary. Mr. McGovern also leaves a daughter, Mrs. DeWitt Lanham of Santa Monica. Police learned he had been despondent for some time.

Mr. McGovern, a native of County Cavin, Ireland, was a gold miner by occupation. In addition to his wife and daughter, he was survived by a brother in San Francisco and a sister in Iowa. The funeral service was conducted this morning (Tuesday) at Stone and Myers' chapel by Rev. Father Joseph L. Bauer of the Catholic Church of the Nativity. Interment was at Woodlawn Cemetery.


