

City Officials Ask Ouster of Japs from State

War-minded mayors and councilmen concerned with protection of their cities from sabotage and fifth column activity went on record last weekend as favoring the ouster of all Japanese, both aliens and citizens, from the state. Mayor Tom McGuire and Councilman George V. Powell and their wives represented Torrance at the midwinter meeting of the mayors and councilmen section of the League of California Municipalities Saturday at Fresno. Other members of the local council were unable to attend the expense-paid junket.

The municipal officials urged the Japanese evacuation and considered plans for protection of their communities from air raids and other possible emergencies. They voted to endorse a telegram sent by the director of the state organization to President Roosevelt which urged immediate removal of all Japanese.

Proposals for uniform ordinances establishing auxiliary police, fire and air raid warden services, civilian defense and control centers were heard during the discussions on the protection of cities.

Richard Graves, the league's executive secretary, submitted copies of Los Angeles ordinances setting up the three services.

"The most obvious advantage to be gained by enactment of such ordinances is protection of the civilian population. From well-meaning but unauthorized volunteers in time of acute emergencies," said Graves.

FIRST AIDERS NEEDED FOR FIELD DUTY

Although the organization's plans are complete and it will function to good advantage under emergency conditions, more qualified First Aid workers are needed to sign up for the Volunteer First Aid Detachment units here, Chairman Casper Clemmer said yesterday.

These units of three workers each with a Red Cross Motor Corps driver, will comprise the field force units in event of an emergency. These units, Clemmer said, will be dispatched immediately to the scene of action from the central control board.

All First Aid people now taking instruction who desire to sign up for any type of emergency duty may do so with their instructor, or at the Red Cross headquarters on Cravens ave., phone 1524, 850 or 486.

Auxiliary Police Want 25 More

Twenty-five more Torrance men will be accepted for training as members of the local Auxiliary Police unit for Civilian Defense, Police Chief John Stroh announced at the study class Tuesday night. Those desiring to enter this service should register at the police station at once, and report for Red Cross first aid instruction at the Civic Auditorium next Tuesday night, Feb. 24, at 7 o'clock at the Civic Auditorium.

The first aid study class, which will devote 20 hours to that subject, will start at that time for all Auxiliary Policemen now in training, totalling about 85 men. The new enrollees will receive this instruction with those who have been attending the school and will get all of the lessons given to date to the first group.
