Council Dismisses \$400-a-Month Engineer as First Economy Move

First move to bring the municipal budget into balance by curtailing expenses met vigorous objection by Councilman George V. Powell and City Engineer Glenn Jain Tuesday afternoon when Councilman James Hitchcock proposed that Frank H. Cannon, structural engineer on the city payroll at \$400 a month since the Nov. 14 earthquake, and Rudolph Myers, \$275-per-month building inspector, be laid off as of April 1.

When the city engineer reported the earthquake reconstruction program was "less than half finished," Hitchcock withdrew Inspector Myers' name from his removal motion and the dismissal, with a letter of thanks for his services, of Engineer Cannon was approved over Powell's negative vote.

Jain wanted the council to retain Cannon on an hourly basis for his engineering advice but this failed to receive councilman support. Asked by Hitchcock if he and two other men in the city engineer's office could not do the remaining quake reconstruction work, Jain declared, "Frankly, no."

Others Under Civil Service
In explaining his negative vote on the motion to dismiss Cannon, Powell indicated that the council is considering a general reduction of the city payroll when he suggested "waiting until after the meeting of the ninth and then do a general paring. I don't think we should show any preference to any department; we should make it city-wide."

However, Councilman Hitchcock reminded him that "I think all other departments come under civil service rulings," a factor which may make a reduction in city personnel difficult. Jain told the council, in giving his reasons why Cannon and Myers should be retained, "I refuse to take the responsibility of any damage if the burden is thrown on our ordinary staff."

"How can you even hold a consulting engineer responsible for further earthquake loss?" questioned Hitchcock, and Councilman Vern Babcock added: "He can't guarantee buildings won't fall."

The city engineer told the council "we've still got a lot of reconstruction work in progress and the contractors now doing it need constant supervision or they will mess up the plans. We've got to watch them with an eagle eye and that requires a full-time man on the job. We have from 20 to 25 jobs in progress now and 20 to 30 more to start."

Powell said: "I am perfectly willing to go along on a general layoff wherever it effects the least detriment to the city and stays in the bounds of the budget. The city engineer is an important department. But I don't want to show any preference and there are other places we can cut."

Work on Signals Will Continue

The Newberry Electrical Corporation has at last received a priority order for the steel signal heads needed for the signal system on Pacific Coast highway and have received word that the signals are being shipped from an eastern point. They expect to be able to re-sume work on the signals to be installed at Pennsylvania, Cypress, Narbonne, Oak, Walnut and Esbelman by the middle of March. There is little work left to be done once the supplies arrive and the signals could be in working order within a few days.

Jap Fined for Vagrancy After 3-Fold Probe

Sanoye Kitazono, 22-year-old Compton Junior college student, will probably keep his night driving to a minimum hereafter as result of his arrest here early Sunday morning and subsequent quizzing by the P. B. L. sheriffs deputies and local police. Charged with vagrancy, he pled guilty before Judge John Shidler yesterday afternoon and was fined \$5.

Kitazono, who lives at 1721 West 182nd st., was reported by residents in the 1600 block on Beech ave. as acting in a suspicious manner. After his arrest, it was found by checking footprints he had provided around Harry Boynton's home at 1629 Beech ave. He was taken into custody by the P. B. L. and later by sheriff's officers for questioning. These investigations proved he was not wanted on any serious charge but just as a lesson to the young Japanese-American, he was haled into court on a vagrancy charge.

City Officials Holding up New Subdivision

Launching of a new subdivision and the construction of 100 houses in Torrance which are badly needed are being held up pending approval of the project by the City Planning Commission and city council, it was learned this week.

The property comprises 17 acres owned by the Lincoln Building & Loan Association at 228th st. and Western ave. The company is reported to have made arrangements for the sale of the property to a large subdivision concern, which in turn would do the developing. Plans call for the erection of five- and six-room houses of moderate cost and provision has been made for building 95 homes suitable for defense workers' families, it was stated to The Herald.

A number of conferences have been held between the interested parties and city officials but so far no agreement has been reached upon certain restrictions and demands made by the city council and planning commission, headed by Mayor Tom McGuire.

MILITARY AREAS CREATED

Establishment of Military Area No. 1 — including approximately the west half of Washington, Oregon and California — from which all Japanese, both alien and American-born, will be evacuated by a continuing process, according to announcement of Lt.-Gen. J. L. DeWitt, commanding general of the Western Defense Command, Tuesday came as a distinct relief to Torrance residents.

Local people had been watching the infiltration of Japanese from previously "restricted areas" with a growing disfavor. Last week a petition, signed by several hundred, was sent to Attorney General Webb demanding some action to prevent an influx which is estimated to have "dumped" approximately 250 Japanese in Torrance-Lomita territory.

All portions of Washington, Oregon, California and Arizona not included in Military Area No. 1 are embraced in Military Area No. 2. Persons in the same category can be excluded from certain portions of this second area. General DeWitt's proclamation establishes the military areas. It does not order any evacuations at the present time.

Plan 10 Centers
Ejection of all enemy aliens and American-born Japanese is expected to begin in about 60 days and Tom C. Clark, alien control coordinator, has announced that they will probably be placed approximately 10 miles inland from the coast at points as soon as the Army can erect prefabricated dwellings on military reservations. One of these "internment centers" may be located in Owens valley where it would not be in close proximity to the Los Angeles Aqueduct system.

"The Army is moving fast in preparation for these evacuation centers," Clark said, adding that "just as soon as the sites are chosen the work of erecting the necessary buildings will be undertaken."

He said the accommodations will be prefabricated houses and other structures of Army type, and that each center will have its own schools and hospitals as well as family dwelling spaces.

"We hope to have Japanese doctors and other services for these centers, and to have the enough acreage so that the evacuees will be useful in the production of needed foodstuffs."

FIELD DAY PLANNED FOR ARMY HERE

A "community field day" of sports, refreshments and entertainment at the city park is being planned by the city recreation department as a means of raising funds that will be used to purchase athletic equipment for soldiers stationed in this area. The day-long program will be Sunday, March 15.

Starting in the morning with a soccer game or a girls' softball game — which will depend on teams available — the program will continue with 30 minutes of entertainment presented from a stage erected in the ball park, service of coffee and doughnuts to the war boys' clubs at noon and another half-hour program of vaudeville and perhaps a ball game in the afternoon.

Tickets will cost 25 cents each and will shortly go on sale. Men in uniform will be admitted free. A committee of two local men, Jack Miller and Michael Strasser, and an Army sergeant will direct the expenditure of the receipts for the benefit of soldiers located in this district.

'Light-Trap' at Entrance to Control Center

Working from plans used in London for construction of similar air raid defensive structures, Torrance city water department employees this week were completing erection of the city's first "light-trap" entrance. It is attached to the former Chamber of Commerce building now used jointly by the water department and Civilian Defense Control Board.

Designed to prevent interior light from shining out when the door is opened, the "light-trap" is portable and can easily be removed from in front of the Chamber building by unscrewing a few bolts and pulling it away. When the Control Board is meeting the front door to the auxiliary building is locked and those who have the proper credentials will be admitted by a guard on the side of the wooden structure.

The Control Board expects to have exclusive use of the entire Chamber building when the water department returns to its Cravena ave. headquarters, now under earthquake rehabilitation. The work on the water department building is expected to be completed about the middle of April, according to Superintendent William H. Stanger.

Harbor City Area Annexed to County Sanitation District

Approval was given this week by the Los Angeles city council to the proposed annexation of property in the Harbor City area to County Sanitation District No. 5, part of the proposed annexation being within the Los Angeles city limits.

Remainder of the area is within unincorporated area, and annexation proceedings will be concluded shortly by the directors of the sanitation districts.
