

Safeguards for Alien Property Revealed Soon

Definite announcement of the steps which the Federal government will take to safeguard property, crop and other interests which enemy aliens and Japanese-Americans must leave behind when they are evacuated from this military area are expected hourly. It was learned today from Lt. Gen. J. L. DeWitt, commanding general of the Western Defense Command.

There have been many indications that the Japanese facing evacuation have been waiting anxiously for specific information on plans for protecting their property, and the promised announcement is expected to be followed by a rush of Japanese to place their tangibles in government hands.

General DeWitt states that Japanese living in the barred zones are still being encouraged to make and follow their own arrangements for resettling in-land, and that many were doing this—just how many or what percentage of the whole he did not know.

He announced that Japanese farmers, aliens or citizens, who plow under growing crops will be arrested and prosecuted as saboteurs.

"Destruction of growing food-stuffs is outright sabotage and will be dealt with accordingly," the general declared. Immediate internment for the duration of the war is one punishment that could be handed out to alien food saboteurs, while in the case of citizens the procedure would be confinement and speedy trial.

REWARD For An American

Because John Garand, Canadian-born American gunsmith, wanted only one reward when he perfected the now famous rifle that bears his name, American boys will have the advantage of the world's finest high-speed automatic military rifle wherever they fight in this deadly war.

Working for years, Garand solved a baffling problem—an automatic mechanism that would not fall under extreme battle conditions, that would stand soaking in water, showers of dirt and sand, falls and blows.

Not so long ago, while U. S. Army brass-hats were finding theoretical fault with the weapon and shaking their heads dubiously at Garand's claims for it, agents of foreign governments were bidding lavishly for the patents. But Garand turned down all offers, gave his rifle to the U. S. Government, and dropped out of the news.

On Dec. 7, in the Philippines,

the rifle of John Garand began its supreme test. Last week, General MacArthur made special report that the powerful automatic had come through as sturdily and dependably as his gallant troops. Then reporters, questioning the inventor in New York, learned that he had received nothing in cash or royalties for his rifle and had asked the government for nothing.

"All the reward I ever wanted," Garand said, "was for my rifle to make good in the U. S. Army. With America at war, what General MacArthur has reported about the gun is my reward and payment, in full."

HINTS FOR HOME-MAKERS

Dishes and pans in which eggs have been cooked or served will wash more easily if soaked first in cold water. Hot water causes eggs to harden and stick to the dish.
