

No Blackout Tests: DeWitt

Lt. Gen. J. L. DeWitt, commanding general of the Western Defense Command, today reiterated his statement that there will be no test blackouts in the western theatre of operations.

"It is not advisable under existing circumstances," he said, "to permit practice or test blackouts in any community throughout the western theatre of operations, and it is desired that none be permitted."

RED CROSS OUTLINES ROLE IN EVENT OF EMERGENCY

The vital role that the American Red Cross will play in any emergency involving civilian defense was outlined this week. Officials stated the Red Cross will assume responsibilities in the emergency medical program as follows:

- (1) Organization of a standard plan for operation of all casualty stations and provide emergency medical care for casualties of any type resulting from disaster.
- (2) Assignment of all personnel to casualty stations.
- (3) Provision of all equipment and supplies for the operation of casualty stations and first aid squads.
- (4) Organization of transportation facilities for the movement of casualties from the scene of disaster to casualty stations and from casualty stations to hospitals.
- (5) Function as a unit of civilian defense and to operate in accord with the control system.

The Red Cross will be exclusively responsible for the mass housing of persons affected by direct enemy action including bombing and sabotage, or in the event of any natural disaster and will in addition provide such disaster affected persons with food, clothing and shelter during the emergency period.
