Women Contribute Most Of Words To 1942 Dictionaries

"Glossed" is Example of Their Influence on Our Language

Ladies take a bow. Lexicographically speaking, you've done it again. Not only are you responsible for a great many words in our modern dictionaries, but according to Dr. Charles E. Funk, editor of Funk & Wagnall's dictionary and famed lexicographer, you put more words in the American language than any other group.

For instance, "glossed" will appear for the first time in new editions of leading dictionaries. Because women have been purchasing more and more fruits, vegetables and other food commodities in glass, they have begun to ask for "glossed" foods when shopping. Hence a new definition of the verb "to gloss" — to put up in a glass jar or jars, as to glass fruit or vegetables.

More words which will include this new interpretation are: Webster's 20th Century, Funk & Wagnall's Standard, The New Century and MacMillan's Modern. Other new words which owe their existence to women include: "hair-do," "supermarket," "sauce," "lipstick," "beautician" and "air-dial." Women first used these words and constant usage resulted in their inclusion in the dictionary. Dr. Funk explains that words find their way into the dictionary only after they have been tried and tested. Once they have been found to be accurate and deserving additions to our daily speech, lexicographers simply record them as permanent fixtures in our language.

Other new words to be inserted in 1942 dictionaries are "jeep," "blitz," "bottle-neck," "paratroop," "drattee," "shaytail," "Axis" and "pocket battleship" — not words coined by women, but resulting from their widespread use among both men and women living in a world at war.

Young Influence
 Some words which will appear for the first time in 1942 editions show the effect of a younger generation on our language — not a few of them being young women. They include such expressions as "gyp," "jam session," "jive," "pan-ywaist," "wacky" and "zombie." And since theatre managers have persisted in making it a weekly institution, "bank night" will find a place in forthcoming editions. "Pinball," though outlawed in many cities, will become a legitimate addition also.

"I can't put words into the dictionary," says Dr. Funk. "People do that through popular usage." And he adds: "I believe that women contribute more words than any other group. As mothers and wives they are the center of our home life. Their choice of words connected with the home or family results in many natural additions to our language."


