### Few Aliens Exempt from Exclusion and Curfew Regulations

The United States indicated in the preceding paragraph.

4. German and Italian aliens awaiting naturalization who had filed a petition for naturalization and who had paid the filing fee therefor on or before Dec. 7, 1941.

5. Patients in hospitals, or confined elsewhere, and too ill or incapacitated to be removed therefrom without danger to life.

6. Inmates of orphanages and the totally deaf, dumb or blind.

Draft Board to Act

Blanks for filing applications for exemption may be obtained now from all postoffices, U. S. immigration service offices, and U. S. Employment Service offices, and from the Wartime Civil Control Administration's office at the Torrance Health Center, 2300 Carson st. Authorized persons will be at these offices during business hours to assist qualified aliens in preparing their application forms.

After exemption application forms are filled out, they must be submitted personally or by mail to the Selective Service Draft Board headquarters nearest to the applicant's residence. Should the Draft Board disapprove an application, it will be returned to the applicant.

If the Draft Board approves an application, it will be forwarded to a designated military commander, with recommendation, for final action. If approved by the military commander, the Draft Board will issue the applicant a permit authorizing him to continue residence and employment in the prohibited or restricted district, exempt from curfew regulations.

The Torrance bus line, so far as it is known, is not considering any changes at the present time but undoubtedly this city's system will be asked to follow the Railroad Commission's recommendations because of the large number of industrial workers employed here who live out of the city.

### State Board Plans War and Post-War Work

SACRAMENTO. — (U. P.) — Victory may depend upon ability to match the able war planning of our enemies, the state planning board said today in outlining a suggested program of war and post-war planning in California.

The state, the board said, can expedite and extend war effort by immediately preparing plans for:

Mobilization of all its available labor forces; utilization of all existing plant capacity and industrial facilities; development of new resources and war industries; maximum production of essential agricultural commodities; provision of housing and community facilities in defense areas; location of army camps and similar establishments; marshalling of all scientific and research facilities capable of meeting military needs and development of more adequate and effective means for local defense.

### Can Assist Communities

Specific policies which the board said merit careful study by the state also include: Restriction of public construction; limitation of governmental services and activities; reduction of state and local taxes, except where public funds are clearly required for support or acceleration of the war effort, and modification of laws and administrative practices to give maximum aid to war activities.

The board said the state can and should assist defense communities in studies of police and fire protection, sewage and water supply problems, school and recreational needs, plans for streets, highways and traffic, and zoning and subdivision control.

### Depend on Federal Policies

The over-shadowing problem of the post-war period, said the board report, will be that of providing useful employment of all workers.

"The state of California, including its subordinate agencies if government and all private interests, has responsibility for war policies which may affect the volume of employment in the post-war period," the report stated. "The direction of state policy in practically every instance must, of course, depend to a greater or lesser degree in federal policies."
