Mrs. Young was born and reared in Pueblo, Colo., where she graduated from an academy. She has been a resident of Southern California for 19 years, residing now at 2355 El Dorado with her husband and two sons. Being a trained nurse, she is alert and having been associated with her father in business has had valuable experience. She is a member of the Catholic Church of the Nativity, American Legion Auxiliary, and was until recently an active member of the Torrance Woman's club and takes a keen interest in civic affairs. Mrs. Young states she will appreciate the support of the citizens in the coming municipal election.

Council Appropriations Amount to \$900

Appropriations approved by the city council Tuesday afternoon totaled \$900.44. They included: \$66.22 for aluminum plant for stock, \$20.22 for graduation banners for the street department, \$140 for rock for street repairs, \$600 plus tax for road materials for Plaza del Amo (to be paid out of the city's quarter-cent state gas tax allocation), and \$75 for road materials for Borden ave.

Yoshinobu, Rotarian-in-Exile, Outlines War Role as Evacuee; Club Gives Him Farewell Gift

Realizing that he can serve America in a manner that will benefit both the national war effort and the condition of his people, James Yoshinobu, American-born Japanese, civic worker and strawberry grower, told fellow-members of the Torrance Rotary club last Thursday night he wanted to undertake an unofficial post as ambassador of good will wherever he is sent. Yoshinobu, who left last Saturday morning with his wife and four children for Santa Anita, the first stop on their move to internment for the rest of the duration, was given a farewell tribute and gift of a beautiful gold ring bearing the Rotary cog-wheel emblem and a diamond setting. The remembrance took form by complete surprise and it was several minutes before he recovered his composure to reply.

President B. C. Buxton, in presenting the ring and testimonial letters concerning Yoshinobu's long-evident patriotism and high character, paid tribute to the Japanese-American who contributed much toward Rotary in Torrance during the 12 years that he has been a member.

A Modern Adventure
When he had overcome his emotions and spoke, Yoshinobu said that he realizes he shares a deep responsibility with other loyal Japanese-Americans to explain the evacuation program and its reasons to some of his race who have feared reprisals and further loss. He pointed out that he would do all he could to tell his fellow-evacuees that their internment was vital both to the safety of this nation and to the Japanese themselves.

segregated at the internment camps and all alien Japanese will be shot." Appreciates Kindness "I want to do all I can to dispel such baseless fears," Rotarian-in-exile Yoshinobu asserted. "We know that is untrue. We must do all we can to help America and the other Allied Nations win the war and we are ready to do all our government asks us to do, wherever it is." Yoshinobu, his fellow-Rotarians know, left his farm property here at considerable sacrifice, yet he made no mention of his personal affairs. As a strawberry grower, he had worked for the past 12 months to bring to harvest his one paying crop within a few weeks. Yet, in common with many of his race, he had to give up his holdings and take the loss. Another typical Japanese strawberry grower, it was learned this week, evacuated from this area where he had a \$7,500 crop about ready for market. He was unable to even obtain a \$500 offer.

Before he said goodbye to his fellow club members, Yoshinobu expressed his wife's appreciation of all the kindnesses she and her children had enjoyed. Mrs. Yoshinobu was active in the Fern Avenue P. T. A., and was always willing, as was her husband, to serve the community when called.

In order to keep in touch with their "home-town" while absent for the duration, Yoshinobu has arranged to have copies of The Herald sent to him when he is finally settled.
