

### SCHOOL PUPILS KEEPING UP WITH ALL WAR ACTIVITIES

Defense activities planned to cooperate with Red Cross and local defense programs, have been outlined by the board of education and are being carried out in an interesting manner in Lomita's elementary schools.

A visit to the Lomita Elementary school found a surprising number of the pupils knitted mufflers and wristlets for soldiers, (and they were certainly doing some excellent knitting) others were busy on maps.

History and geography are being stressed now and world maps, drawn to scale by the pupils are studied daily while the many remote places mentioned in the daily news are located by the pupil on his own map. It would be safe to guess that many children in our schools have a better idea of the places and areas being used as scenes of war in the present conflict than many of their elders.

#### Five-Point Program

Geography now has some sense when a pupil locates a place in Australia and says: "My uncle is there with Gen. MacArthur." It's no longer just a lesson.

History and patriotism are being taught by concentrating on five important gems of American history. The first is the "Star Spangled Banner." All grades are being drilled in singing it, especially the first, second and third verses. Every Monday morning, led by the school orchestra, the pupils sing it, salute and pledge allegiance to the flag.

The pledge to the flag is the second point being taught in this program. The third is the memorizing by older pupils of the Preamble to the Constitution. The fourth is the memorizing by the fifth and sixth graders of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.

Fifth is the study of the Bill of Rights. Pupils are not required to memorize it but are taught to read it fluently, to

#### understand it and appreciate it.

**Paintings Removed**  
Air raid and fire drills are held frequently and the children are kept informed of instructions and preparations for defense activities.

One item of interest, and something householders should consider in their blackout rooms is the fact that all large paintings which formerly hung in the main hall, have been removed. As the children are sent to the inner halls in case of raids, it was feared that if actual bombings occurred, these heavy paintings might fall. So for the duration the halls are unadorned.
