Yes, The Herald remembers Rev. Porter, remembers his work in this community which is a better one for having him a part of it. We like to recall his funny stories—and he always had a "good one" ready—his little boxes of candy, his interest in any move for civic betterment, his human mannerisms—hurried speech, deep convictions which never obtruded to the point of "holier than thou" and his brisk walk.

At Fairhaven Cemetery near Santa Ana the Masonic lodge was in charge of the committal service.

Power Line for Alcoa in Court

Condemnation proceedings for right-of-way for the new high voltage transmission line that is to serve the \$50,000,000 Alcoa aluminum reduction plant near Torrance were filed today in Los Angeles county superior court by the city of Los Angeles.

The special line will extend from receiving station "C" in Wilmington north and west along the Dominguez channel and via James street to the plant. It will extend from Lomita and Wilmington boulevards on the south to the plant site at Normandie avenue near 180th street.

The plant will be the largest user of electrical energy to date, with a bill of around \$5,000,000 annually. The L. A. city council is to decide next Monday whether a special low rate will be granted. A 60-foot right-of-way is being taken, and the city will acquire it in fee simple. Defendants include the Del Amo Estate, Dominguez Estate, Watson Land Company, Mark Hanna, Hal A. Lloyd and C. J. Moody.

May Building Total \$24,975

Despite the Federal curbs on building materials affected by priorities, new construction in Torrance last month kept pace with the same month a year ago, mainly because of the continued reconstruction of buildings damaged by the Nov. 14 earthquake.

The 47,935 net tons of talc and soapstone produced in California last year was the largest annual output ever reported in the state, Walter W. Bradley, state mineralogist, reported this week. Last year's production was valued at \$22,396.

No Delays in Jap Evacuation

Reports of conflicting rumors reaching Army officials made it necessary to reiterate again today that evacuation of Japanese from the Pacific Coast will go ahead on schedule notwithstanding the effect on agricultural production. "Evacuation will go forward at an uninterrupted pace. Military necessity is an unrelenting taskmaster, and the harvesting of crops or other agricultural tasks cannot be allowed to retard the evacuation program."

The Colonel remarked that the recent wholesale evacuation orders, which now number 32, should convince everyone of the falsity of statement made by uninformed persons to the contrary.
