### GAY VIENNA WAS SAD AT HEART, SAYS THEATRE MAN

LOS ANGELES—Gay Vienna, as she appeared to the stranger, was not gay at heart, says Heinrich Schnitzler, who used to direct plays in the Austrian capital.

Addressing an audience at the Los Angeles campus of the University of California, Schnitzler declared that Viennese gaiety had a tragic counterpart. The city which conquered the world with its music was the place where Mozart nearly starved, Beethoven suffered and Raimund killed himself.

"Vienna to the visitor always seemed gentle, charming and cozy. The people were laughing and were very different from the Prussians, but to many who knew, the gaiety had a tone of despair," said Schnitzler. Referring to the conflict of races and ideology within Austria, existing from the middle of the sixteenth century, Schnitzler stressed the long discord between the German and non-German elements. He quoted Karl Krause: "In Berlin the situation is serious but not hopeless. In Vienna it is hopeless but not serious." But Krause was German.

"Vienna would merit little attention by virtue of Strauss waltzes and gaiety alone," asserted Schnitzler. "Wine, women and song were not the essence of Austrian habits."

### 85,000 Japs Moved from Military Area

The Army this week issued a summary of its activities in connection with the evacuation of Japanese from Pacific Coast areas to date, showing that approximately 85,000 persons have actually been moved from Military Area No. 1, comprising the western portions of California, Oregon, Washington and Southern Arizona, or are under orders to be moved to Assembly, Reception or Relocation Centers by May 22.

Further Exclusion Orders affecting those Japanese remaining in the Military Area who are not included in the first 81 orders will follow in rapid succession, Lieut. Col. Martin F. Hass, in charge of initial evacuation operations, stated. The summary shows that 68 of the 110 counties lying within Military Area No. 1 comprising the western portions of California, Oregon and Washington, and Southern Arizona, have been completely evacuated or are in the process of being evacuated.

The 81 orders affect an estimated total of 85,000 Japanese in the four states, of which approximately 58,000 have been actually moved to Assembly, Reception or Relocation Centers, and the remaining total of approximately 27,000 are in process of evacuation or under orders to be evacuated by May 22.

"When evacuations under these first 81 orders are complete, our main coastal cities, with the exception of Los Angeles, will have been cleared of Japanese," Col. Hass said. "This will include San Diego, San Francisco, Portland and Seattle. In addition our surrounding strategic areas will be practically cleared of Japanese. The program has moved ahead swiftly and smoothly since the first evacuation order affecting 226 Japanese on Bainbridge Island, Puget Sound, Washington, was issued on March 23. In less than two months more than 58,000 Japanese have been moved to Assembly and Reception Centers with families, friends and even communities transported intact without incident."

### Ware Drops Race for Governor to Campaign for Attorney General

Withdrawing his candidacy for Governor on the Republican ticket, Wallace L. Ware, Los Angeles attorney, this week announced: "I am now convinced that I will make my most effective contribution to the people's crusade for the redemption of California by wholehearted support to Earl Warren for Governor and by offering my services for the office of Attorney General." He will seek both Republican and Democratic nominations for this office.

"I am for industrial freedom," Ware said. "I am for the great cause of labor, organized or unorganized. I am for the fundamental right of every man or woman to work without the payment of tribute or fealty to any man or set of men. I am for the establishment of common honesty and mutual respect within and between the ranks of labor and management."

"Therefore, I am unalterably opposed to hot cargo, secondary boycott, or any other coercive device. I am unalterably opposed to the general application by labor racketeers of the un-American doctrine of the closed shop."
