

ALL JAPS WILL BE MOVED OUT OF COUNTY BY JUNE 2

The largest single exclusion order issued since the Army inaugurated its program of clearing Military Area No. 1, comprising the western portions of California, Oregon, Washington and Southern Arizona of Japanese, was announced last Friday by Lieut. Gen. J. L. DeWitt, Commanding General of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army. The new order, affecting an estimated 4,100 Japanese in various portions of Los Angeles city and county not previously covered by exclusion orders, will result in the evacuation of all Japanese from the city and county of Los Angeles by June 2.

The new order, numbered 86, brings the total of orders issued for the city and county of Los Angeles to 23. Of the total issued, evacuation operations have been completed under 21, involving a total of 29,838 Japanese, including 835 volunteers who went from the city of Los Angeles to Manzanar to assist in the inauguration of the reception center there.

Of the 23 orders affecting the city and county of Los Angeles, eight have covered the various portions of Los Angeles city proper under which 18,967 Japanese have already been evacuated, including the original volunteers to Manzanar, and all others are under orders to be evacuated by June 2, under Order No. 86. The remaining 14 orders, including No. 84 under which evacuation was completed Monday, cover areas in Los Angeles county outside of the city proper.

BIG GUNS AT FORT ROAR

Cannonading which shook houses throughout this area and re-echoed in many inland communities late last Saturday afternoon marked the firing of the big coast defense rifles at Fort MacArthur. The practice was watched by several hundred soldiers and civilians who lined the hillside around the gun emplacements. More than a score of rounds were fired. Crossers of water where big shells struck were barely visible on the horizon where the target was being towed, a distance watchers estimated at 20 miles. The danger area was from six to 25 miles on a quadrant south to southeast of the Point Fermin lighthouse.

More firing practice was also heard here last week as medium-caliber guns went into operation.

King Provides Harbor City With Ambulance Car

Harbor City has an ambulance. Charles F. King, who for many years was secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, is now vice-president and has always generously contributed to every civic need, has met the need for an ambulance by equipping a station wagon so that it can be converted instantly for that service.

The machine will be kept ready for emergency use. King has also donated a table for the Red Cross workroom, kerosene lanterns and other supplies for the casualty station at the school.

Young Men To Register June 30

All young men 18 and 19 years of age will be required to register Tuesday, June 30, to complete the nation's wartime census of its manpower. This will be the fifth registration ordered by President Roosevelt. It will furnish the Federal government with data on all men from 18 to 65 years of age. Young men of 18 and 19 are not subject to military service under the Selective Service Act, it is pointed out.

Also ordered to register on June 30 are men who reached their 20th birthday between Dec. 31, 1941, and June 30, 1942. These men would be subject to military service.

Gardena Fire Dept. Flareup Is Dampened

Gardena's city council effectively dampened the smouldering controversy around the fire department Monday night by ousting Fire Chief Don Parrott who resigned with five other members of the department last Friday and asked for two-weeks vacation pay. The council accepted all resignations but denied vacations, making the ouster effective the first two weeks of June. Parrott had been connected with the Gardena fire department since 1931 and was chief since 1933.

Immediately after Parrott had been ousted, Councilman Earl Powers, appointed Fire Captain George Springstead acting fire chief. Springstead's resignation submitted last week becomes effective June 10, but his appointment as acting head of the department indicated that a satisfactory reorganization plan is under way which may result in retention of the other four members of the department.

Parrott took exception to councilman action, May 1, when his car allowance was discontinued by the city. He claimed he became a "walking fire chief."

Landier Buys 68 Coaches for Local Bus Line

Outlining his firm's plan to relieve the "transportation bottleneck" for defense workers in this area, F. P. Landier, president of the Landier Transit Company, has informed the Los Angeles Board of Public Utilities and Transportation that the company has purchased 68 new motor coaches.

The Landier line routing is the same as the Torrance Municipal bus line from Imperial highway to Normandie at Carson st. and parallel and approximately one-half mile west of the Los Angeles Motor Coach Company's Hollywood-Long Beach line from Carson to B st., Wilmington, where the P.E. gives service to the shipyards on the West Basin.

The company's application for authority to operate its proposed direct service between Los Angeles Railway's "7" and "V" lines at Imperial highway to Regan and Deak sts. in the San Pedro district will be the subject of a conference with Torrance officials at suggestion of the board.

Under the plan service would be provided between the Los Angeles Railway lines and the proposed aluminum plant at 190th st. and Normandie ave., and to the shipyards adjacent to the West Basin in Los Angeles Harbor.

INFLUX TO STATE SETS NEW RECORD

Almost half a million persons have come to California during the first four months of 1942 and the gain in population is at least equal to the all-time records set in 1941, it was revealed this week by Victor Killick, chairman of the California Population Commission.

The means of arrival is shifting from private cars to commercial carriers but the number of passengers per car is increasing. Out-of-state private cars have decreased 15% in figures kept by the border checking stations of the agriculture department, while the number of passengers per car has jumped from 2.7 persons to 2.9.

Killick stated that tourist travel has virtually stopped and people now entering the state are seeking employment and a chance to establish a home in California.

A total of 485,301 persons entered during the first four months of 1942, including 326,708 in private cars, 141,381 in commercial carriers and 17,395 in trucks. During April alone, 186,381 persons came into the state, including 78,821 in out of state cars; 66,897 in cars registered to California (presumably returning from trips) and 41,708 riding in stages.

Weed Abatement Crews Burning Off Vacant Lots

The Weed Abatement Section of the Los Angeles Department of Forest and Fire Warden started clearing operations in the field Monday. Weed abatement crews were assigned districts throughout the county and received instructions to remove the weed fire hazard from properties that have not been cleared by the owners.

The lots covered to be cleared are weed covered lots which are fire hazards to adjacent improved properties, and have been posted, notifying owners that unless the hazard is removed the county crews will remove same and charges will be placed on tax bills.

The Weed Abatement Section recently moved from 701 East Jefferson boulevard, to 808 North Spring st., fifth floor, telephone MU 5-1111, Extension 3884. Owners who desire to remove the weed fire hazard from their properties are advised to write or call the Weed Abatement Section signifying their intentions so that proper notations may be made on Weed Abatement maps. Be sure to give lot and tract number, or other legal description, of property involved. Property owners who have so notified the Weed Abatement Section will be contacted in case their properties have not been satisfactorily cleared and given an opportunity to do so.
