Numerous donations of used clothing have been received by the War Relief Committee of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, since the initial meeting April 26.

Since that date meetings have been held each Thursday afternoon at the church committee room. Scientists and friends interested in assisting with the work are cordially invited to attend.

More than 165 garments have been completed, including sweaters, men's suits, bathrobes, women's and girls' suits, dresses, skirts, blouses, full-length coats; also warm quilts of wool blocks, wool stockings, socks, underwear, knit hats, gloves and purses.

Completed garments are sent to Santa Monica to be sorted. Some are sent overseas and some stored for emergency use here. The work will continue for the duration. Small children's garments are being made now for shipment this month.

Eldene Paige, Navy Nurse, Is Officially Reported Missing

"The Navy Department exceedingly regrets to advise you that according to the records of this Department your daughter, Eldene E. Paige, nurse U. S. Navy, was performing her duty in the service of her country in the Manila Bay area when that station capitulated. She will be carried on the records of the Navy Department as missing pending investigation.

"No record of her death or injury has been received and she may be a prisoner of war. It will probably be several months before definite official information can be expected concerning her status.

"Sincere sympathy is extended to you in your anxiety and you are assured that any reports received will be communicated to you promptly.

"Rear Admiral Randall Jacobs, 'The Chief of Naval Personnel.'"

The above message was received by Mrs. W. R. Paige of 25926 Cayuga ave. this week.

Trained in Orange County Miss Eldene Paige was last heard from at Christmas time. She was then serving in the Naval hospital at Canaca, 30 miles from Manila, at a Navy station for Harbor City, pharmacist's mate, first class, was also stationed at Canaca when his wife received her last letter from him and the Navy has sent her a similar message.

Miss Paige graduated from Naahome in the summer class of 1930 when she was but 16 years old. She had planned to be a nurse but was unable to enter training until she was 18. She had to wait until December 1931. She remained at home in Lomita until her birthday and then made arrangements to enter training at the Orange County hospital.

There she was graduated and later served as a graduate nurse. She also served in the San Pedro hospital, leaving to become superintendent of surgery at the Hanford hospital.

On July 29, 1938 she enlisted in the Navy, going to Mare Island. In October 1940 she went to Guam, remaining on duty there until September, 1941, when she was transferred to the Philippines.

Devoted to her profession, she answered the country's call when there was a great lack of Navy nurses but even in 1938 Miss Paige felt that this country would be in war and told her family that she wanted to serve in the profession in which she had trained.

The first station in which she was held in the hospitals in which she served here is indicated by the frequent letters and visits received by Mrs. Paige from her daughter's former associates, who like her host of Lomita friends, are anxious to receive word of her safety.
