



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Historian Says War May be Decided This Year

BERKELEY.—The war for the world may well be decided this year on the Russian front, says Dr. Robert J. Kerner, Sather professor of history in the University of California.

Dr. Kerner points out that the immediate objective of the Axis at the present time is a junction of their forces in the Indian Ocean after the Near East has been conquered and Japan has established herself firmly in the southwestern Pacific and southeastern Asia.

Russian resistance, he adds, is the factor which is preventing the closing of this giant strategic movement by Japan and Germany.

"The plains of Russia are the center of world strategy at this time," Dr. Kerner says. "While Hitler is heavily engaged by Russia, any serious attack on the Near East is out of the question. While Russia remains strong, Japan dare not focus all her forces on defeating the United States."

"Russia plays a most significant part—perhaps a deciding part—in this whole global war. The greatest concentration of forces are opposed there. Today the Russian task is the major task of the war: that of organizing the German armies before they can get set for their spring offensive. That spring offensive is coming this spring, not in 1943. As far as the Russians are concerned, then, 1942 is the decisive year. Either they will crush the Germans or the Germans will defeat them. Complete defeat of the German armies would quench a

large part of the conflagration that encircles the globe. It would enable us to concentrate more efforts on Japan, to cause a quick collapse of her shaky structure of empire. Defeat of German armies on the Russian plains would make Japan's war with Russia difficult, almost impossible, for all Russia's strength would be free to cope with any Japanese attack. It would hold Japan at home, unable to exploit the conquests she has so far made. As long as Russian resistance keeps up, the Axis will be unable to close the globe-girdling pincers."
