Drive to Save Waste Kitchen Fats Under Way

A nationwide campaign to see that housewives save all waste kitchen fats is now under way in Southern California. All sorts of grease—drippings from roasts, from frying, and even cooking greases that are no longer usable—are sorely needed as a basic material in making explosives.

Four thousand butchers from Santa Maria to San Diego are paying five cents a pound for all the grease brought in by housewives. The request for saving and handling the grease includes only a few simple requirements:

1. Strain out all foreign matter when pouring from the pan.
2. Keep your daily accumulations in a large wide-mouthed container—preferably a two-pound coffee can.
3. Sell to your butcher in quantities of one pound or more.
4. Torrance housewives who cooperate in the grease campaign are requested to donate the money they receive from the sale of the fats to the city ambulance fund.

Containers for these contributions are now prominently displayed at all meat market counters here. Two hundred million pounds of glycerine was used in the United States last year, according to the committee's figures. With a tremendous increase in use by America and her Allies set for this year, industry expects to obtain, at least 50,000,000 pounds of its output from grease supplied by housewives.

If only one-fourth of the kitchen greases normally wasted can be saved this year, it will provide the power for firing a billion and a quarter anti-tank shells at the enemy.

Explosives are derived from grease through reducing the grease to glycerine and then to nitro-glycerine.

CD Ball Series Benefits Wardens


