## SERVICE MEN CAN VOTE AS ABSENTEES

Thousands of California boys in uniform can vote at the primary election Aug. 25. Under California law they needed no act of Congress to permit them to cast absentee ballots as long as they are on duty within the United States.

Applications for absentee ballots must be in the office of the registrar of voters between Aug. 5 and 20, inclusive. Here is a simple form that may be followed.

The request must carry the voter's own signature.
