Draft Deferment For Occupation Reasons Now Being Withdrawn

Another indication of the steadily mounting demand for state selective service headquarters this week instructed local draft boards to "plan for the withdrawal" from industry of men deferred for occupational reasons.

Lt. Col. Kenneth Leitch, state director, emphasized that such men have only been loaned to industry. He emphasized that such deferments cannot continue indefinitely.

Local boards were instructed to deny applications for occupational deferments in cases where only a short replacement training period is needed, and where the registrant does not have a background of the kind of employment for which he was deferred.

Occupational deferments to men engaged in agriculture and other seasonal work where replacements are not available will not be disturbed at the present time, Col. Leitch said. Boards were instructed not

to release Class 2-B (vital to defense) registrants for enlistment purposes. Withdrawal of these registrants, it was indicated, will be done in an "orderly" manner under the direction of selective service officials.

It was pointed out that no mass enlistments crippling vital production would be permitted.

Local boards were urged to encourage men with dependent wives and children to seek jobs in vital war industries.
