Splitting of a number of precincts was made necessary for the coming election because of the growth in population. At the 1940 general election there were 4,994 precincts, or 433 fewer than today.

Robert Berry Wounded In Sea Fight With Japs

Robert Berry, who saw service in the South Pacific and was wounded in the leg in a battle, was at his home in Winfield, Kans., recently on a short furlough. His twin brother Raymond was stationed at Wake Island. He has not been heard from since the battle there. Both boys have many friends in Torrance. They are nephews of Mrs. L. A. Kent of 2100 220th st.

Robert was aboard a battleship about 230 miles out from Sydney, Australia when the Japs were sighted. About 50 Nip planes came over and the resulting fight lasted for nearly 10 hours.

"They paid dearly for their effort for we gave them a real battle with our anti-aircraft guns and got at least half of them," he is quoted as saying in The Winfield (Kans.) Courier. "They did a lot of damage, however. It was my job to clean up after every attack. It was while I was doing that work that they got me in the leg with a machine gun bullet. But the wounds were not serious."

The crew got the battleship to Sydney safely and Robert was sent back to the Mare Island hospital at San Francisco Bay where he was confined for four weeks. He has not seen his brother Raymond since a chance meeting in San Francisco six months ago.



Tin Cans Get War Duty at School Here

Tin cans, once a bit of discard, now are playing a vital role in the preparation of young and old for their part in war industries. It's all due to the need of every bit of adaptable metals in the war industries themselves. Like every other school and high school in the nation, metal working classes are feeling the pinch of metal restrictions, so rigid that high school welding classes have been refused War Production Board priority ratings on scrap metal. Sheet metal classes, many organized to teach adult men and women aircraft metal work, are turning to substitutes.

Instructor's Idea At Torrance Junior high school the young students are conducting a systematic tin can salvage drive.

Boys prepare the cans for stripping and while their task is more tedious than when worked from sheet tin, they know they are taking a part in the war effort.

Ivan H. Grigsby, general metals course instructor, originated the idea of using tin cans in his classes and has adapted the same source for the metal which is used by a class of women aircraft metals workers of which he is instructor in South Gate Evening high school.
