The Class B teams are playing today—Gardena at Narbonne and San Pedro at Banning. The Torrance Bees are playing a practice game today with Mt. Carmel's Bee squad on the local field.

Torrance varsity bites into the league standings Friday afternoon, Oct. 16 by playing Gardena here. The Torrance Bees open their league campaign Thursday afternoon, Oct. 15, by traveling to Gardena.

**Six Lettermen Back**  
Coaches Hoffer and Winfield, who are sharing the mentoring duties for both local teams, have no idea how their squads stack up in comparison with other Marine League contenders. They have six varsity men of 1941 for a nucleus of the new heavy-weight team but the reserves are uncertain.

Three former Tartar players are holdovers in the backfield—Bob Leech, Walter Smith and Willie Post. Tom Justice and Charles Rippey are hold-over ends and Dave Wilkes is a letterman guard.

## Clark Succeeds Sargis at Steel Plant Job Here

Appointment of S. G. Sargis as assistant manager of industrial relations was announced this week by the Columbia Steel Co. Sargis, who replaces C. T. Spivey, recently transferred to the company's Utah operations, was first employed by Columbia Steel as a draftsman in 1933 at its Irton, Utah plant. In 1934, he entered the coke department as engineer and clerk and served as testing engineer, industrial engineer until 1941 when he was transferred to the Torrance plant as works industrial engineer.
