**Draft Deferment of City Workers Asked to Aid Smaller Cities**

Governor Olson has addressed an appeal to Col. Kenneth Leitch, state selective service director, on behalf of the cities and counties of the state asking the deferment of policemen, firemen and civil service employees in the interests of the war effort.

The appeal came in response to urgent requests from agencies throughout the state who have indicated alarm at the serious manpower shortages threatened by what they term "indiscriminate drafting of public servants."

A. Beldon Gilbert, executive director of the Peace Officers Civil Service association, registered an appeal to Col. Leitch, Olson and Lieut. Gov. Ellis E. Patterson, urging immediate action be taken particularly in behalf of the smaller cities in the state.

Gilbert pointed out that "cities like Hermosa Beach, Torrance, and Redondo have had their police force reduced to almost a skeleton crew by the draft and enlistments of police officers." Gilbert contended further, that while it takes two years to thoroughly train a police officer and at least nine months to give him rudimentary training, it requires only six months to train a pilot or bombardier.

**Reduced Phone Rates on Control Units Sought**

Joining other South Bay cities in a "united front" to secure special low rates on telephone installations at Civilian Defense control centers, the Torrance city council Tuesday night adopted a resolution asking the State Railroad Commission to grant the concession. Copies will be sent state senators and assemblymen.

In urging the passage of the measure, Police Chief John Stroth pointed out that there would be a considerable saving to the city if the telephone company was allowed to reduce its rates on the control center phone installations which are only used during practices and alerts.

Other matters transacted by the council Tuesday night were:

**35-Mile Limit Regulations Has No Teeth Here**

Local police cannot arrest motorists driving faster than the 35-mile-an-hour limit prescribed by President Roosevelt, Police Chief John Stroth told members of the city council Tuesday night. The officers can only give warnings he said. Action by the state legislature to "put teeth" into the new speed regulation is not expected until the solons meet in January.

Stroth reported that Los Angeles police tried issuing reckless driving citations to motorists violating the 35-mile rule but the majority of such charges were dismissed by the courts and the plan was abandoned.

**Service Teams Carded for Title Game Nov. 8**

The championship of the Pacific Coast for Service Football teams will be at stake Sunday afternoon, Nov. 8, in the Los Angeles Coliseum when the Navy Pre-Flight Airdevils of St. Mary's play the Santa Ana Army Base Flyers in a game sponsored by the U. S. O. and the American Legion.

Lt. Comdr. Gerald A. Tex Oliver, coach of the Navy Airdevils, has one of the "big name" outfits of the nation with a number of All-Americans playing on the squad. The Army Flyers, coached by Garrett Arbuckle, Marty Brill, two former All-Americans, is rated by experts as the strongest Service team in Southern California.

The rivalry between the two Service squads should be terrific when they line up for action at the Coliseum. Tex Oliver had 126 men turn out for football. He now has a squad of 56 players on the varsity group and another group on the B-squad. Ensign Frankie Albert, Stanford All-American; Ensign Vic Bottari, whose running and passing put California in the Rose Bowl; Ensign Bobby Grayson, Stanford immortal and Nello Falaschi of Santa Clara fame are backfield aces doing duty for the Airdevils along with a number of great Cadet players just making a name in top football.
