

### Repeal of State Personal Income Tax Will Aid Wage Earners

"Now that the American people are called upon to pay the largest tax bill in history, California voters will understand why we took steps months ago to have the state income tax laws submitted to their consideration by initiative petition," the Committee to repeal the state personal income tax, Prop. No. 4 on the ballot, said today in a prepared statement. The Committee continued:

"The dark tax picture we have been painting for months, now has suddenly become stark reality in every home in California. A married man, for example, earning up to \$2,000, will have to pay seven times more federal taxes than he is now paying. All wage earners will be affected similarly.

"A single girl, earning \$25 a week, will pay U. S. income and victory taxes next year aggregating \$154.08, six weeks salary, in other words.

"With the state surplus at \$46,000,000 as of Oct. 1, and increasing at the rate of \$80,000,000 a year, it is only common sense to ask for repeal of this duplicating and unnecessary state personal income tax.
