Packages Sent Overseas Must be Requested by Servicemen Themselves

The large volume of mail and packages sent to troops overseas will make new army postal restrictions necessary and effective Friday, no packages may be sent to a soldier overseas unless it contains an article requested by the soldier and the request has been approved by his commander. The package will not be accepted by the postoffice unless the written request bearing the commander's approval is presented, Stinson said.

The only exception will be in the case of soldiers sent abroad while packages addressed to them were in transit. Magazines and newspapers may be mailed only by the publishers.

V-mail will continue to be welcomed, but ordinary letters bearing air mail stamps will be handled like regular mail.
