Bird Assumes Maritime Post At San Pedro

Edwin A. Bird, manager of the San Pedro U. S. Employment Service office, assumed his new duties as Southern California administrative chief for the Pacific coast maritime industry board Saturday in the port city.

The presidential-appointed board, working through offices in major ports as an arm of the war shipping administration, seeks to expedite through cooperation of unions and employers the handling of cargo and return of ships to the high seas. Bird's title will be administrative assistant to Paul Eliel, Stanford university professor, who is chairman of the maritime industry board. James Corley of the San Pedro longshoremen's union has been head of the board's San Pedro office. He is returning to waterfront work.


