### Woman Worker Helps Family War Effort

When Mildred "Millie" Dineson, 29, of Prole, Iowa, took a war winning job at the National Supply plant here she meant business.

As a milling machine operator, turning out vital airplane parts, Millie is tops and when she took over the job of shop steward in her department she signed up 50 new members for the Oil Workers International Union, C.I.O., in the first two months, union officials reported this week.

This is the first real job Millie has had but doing a man's work is nothing new to her. Mrs. Dineson's father died in 1930 and left her mother with five children of which Millie is the eldest. She then took her place on the farm driving tractors, binders and trucks.

"Maybe I have more reasons than other girls for wanting to beat Hitler and Hirohito and get this war over as soon as possible," she says. "I have a baby brother on a warship somewhere in the Pacific, my other brother is ready to sail across the Atlantic with an Army unit and my husband is in training for the Merchant Marine.

"And I know that it is going to take all we can give them to do the job in a hurry," Mrs. Dineson asserts.

### Federal Auto Use Stamps on Sale at Postoffices

The new \$5 auto use tax stamp is now on sale in all post-offices. The stamp, which is yellow, evidences payment of the Federal use tax for the year beginning July 1, 1943, and ending June 30, 1944.

No car can be legally operated after July 1, without the use tax stamp being affixed. All stamps must be purchased on or before that date. Proof of purchase must be given ration boards in applying for tire and gasoline rations.

Stamps are serially numbered, gummed on the face, and have space on the back for entry of the make, model, serial number, and the state license number. Postoffices will sell stamps over the counter for cash only and will handle no mail order business. In California, according to state law, the stamps must be affixed to the lower right-hand corner of the windshield. To guard against loss or theft, purchasers should dampen the adhesive side of the stamp, and should make a record of the serial number which appears on the face of the stamp.

### Modified Sports Program Planned

Following a meeting of athletic representatives of the various high schools in the Los Angeles city school system, it was announced this week that a modified program of football and basketball will be carried on next season. The football season has been cut to six league games, the first scheduled for Oct. 15.

Basketball will begin Dec. 3 and wind up Jan. 21, 1944. All plans are adopted for the first semester only, and schedules, which present numerous difficulties due to the curtailment of games, will be announced later.

### Parking Near Rubber Plants Banned by L. A.

To a request of the Shell Chemical Co. that automobile parking be prohibited adjacent to the synthetic rubber plants in the vicinity of 200th and Figueroa sts., the Los Angeles Police Commission has complied so far as it has jurisdiction.

The site only recently was annexed to Los Angeles and the commission found that it had only jurisdiction to ban parking on Vermont ave., between Knox and James sts. A request by John McLaughlin of 241 1/2 East 51st st., that four-way boulevard steps be placed at 190th st. and Western ave. because of the great increase in traffic due to the adjacent aluminum and rubber plants could not be fulfilled by the Los Angeles authorities because the city of Torrance opposes the north-bound stop on Western.

The commission agreed with Street Traffic Engineer Ralph T. Dorsey that a survey should be made of the traffic situation and that further efforts to get Torrance to agree to a four-way stop intersection be made.



