


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Girl, Aged 4, Honoree At Birthday Party

THANKSGIVING DINNER TABLE OUTLOOK GOOD

America's Thanksgiving tables should groan under the weight of holiday food this year despite the shortage of turkeys—a shortage partially brought about by government purchases for the armed forces—two officials of the nation's leading food distributor reported today.

"This year's quota for turkeys for civilian consumption will be approximately half of last year's supply," said Ben Gabriel, head of the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co.'s poultry department, "but Americans will find a plentiful supply of chickens and geese available to replace the traditional bird on the holiday menu."

"Patriotic Americans will make potatoes a big part of the Thanksgiving meal," said Harvey Baum, head of produce-buying operations for the same company, "because of the record crop of this commodity which is clamoring for consumption." In addition, Baum said, a big variety of vegetables and late fruits will be available, including sweet potatoes, turnips, rutabagas, squash, cabbage, celery and snap beans.

Although there is a reduced crop of apples and pears, there will be sufficient to meet Thanksgiving requirements, he added, and at the same time pointed out that a similar situation exists in the cranberry market. The housewife will be able to top off the meal, Baum concluded, with peanuts, pecans and grapes.

Greyhound Lines Aid Recruiting Women for Waves

Lending aid to the U.S. Navy's recruitment program to enlist 20,000 more young women in the WAVES, Pacific Greyhound is carrying a large advertising message in more than 500 newspapers of California, Oregon, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico and parts of Utah and Texas, urging eligible young women, not now engaged in war work, to volunteer for Naval service.

"In ships, planes and fire power," states Lieut. Irene Williamson, who is the 12th Naval District WAVES procurement officer, "our Navy is now the greatest in the world. But ships and planes are useless without trained women to man them. The Navy must use thousands of Navy men now filling shore billets to man our new fleets. If these men are to be made available for combat duty, the young women of America must step in and take over their jobs. If scheduled offensives in this global war are to be carried out, the Navy must have 20,000 more young women by the end of this year to release men for combat service."

WAVES are trained at Hunter college in New York City and then assigned to Naval stations throughout the United States. Applicants for enlistment must be between 20 and 36 years of age, and have had at least two years of high school education. Young women meeting enlistment requirements are urged to apply at Women's Naval Reserve headquarters, Central Tower bldg., San Francisco or any U.S. Navy recruiting station.

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

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
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
