Officers Confer With Howser on Child Problems

John Stroh, Torrance chief of police, attended a conference of Los Angeles county police department heads at the office of District Attorney Fred N. Howser last Thursday.

The officers were invited by the district attorney to gather for the purpose of hearing an explanation of plans to carry out the new program to cope with juvenile delinquency in the county.

"The meeting was an interesting one and I learned much," commented Chief Stroh. Howser talked before approximately 100 police chiefs and juvenile officers and emphasized the importance of placing the responsibility for juvenile delinquency on adults who contribute to youth misconduct.

"Wherever there is a juvenile delinquent, there also usually is a delinquent adult. I want both brought in and I believe in that way we will get to the bottom of this thing. Child delinquency is not always the fault of the child. There must be contributing circumstances somewhere that may be the real cause. That is what we want to find out," the district attorney is reported as saying.

Superior Judge Samuel R. Blake and A. A. Scott, juvenile court jurist, also spoke at the session.

Community Problem

"The problem of juvenile protection is the responsibility of the entire community and cannot be done by law enforcement agencies alone. The job is one that requires the help of every person in eliminating from his community the factors which make for juvenile delinquency," Howser asserted.

The work already being done by fraternal and service, patriotic and religious groups in many communities in coordinating the energies of their community on the problems of juvenile delinquency.

While the new Juvenile Protection Bureau will exercise supervision of conditions in public places offering refreshment or entertainment to juveniles, it will not be to put anyone out of business but to secure their friendly cooperation. In the majority of cases the management of places frequented by juveniles is eager to eliminate danger spots when these are brought to their attention," the district attorney told the conferees.

The new Juvenile Protection Bureau will also investigate and seek to eliminate the newsstand sale of salacious or pornographic literature to juveniles.

Losses From Fire Extremely Low in Torrance Last Year

J. E. McMaster, Torrance fire chief, has revealed in his report covering activities of the fire department covering all of 1943 that the total loss by fires during the year was estimated at \$2,845, with an additional \$50 loss reported by the branch station at WALTERIA.

In Torrance proper the department received a total of 187 alarms. The greatest number of runs were to grass fires, 95 being reported. Sixteen runs were made into the residential district, 26 to oil fields, 13 to industrial plants, 10 to auto fires. No serious losses resulted from fires in the business area. Altogether 22,500 feet of hose were laid.

The WALTERIA station responded to 31 alarms, 26 of which were on account of grass fires. Firemen at this station laid 6,530 feet of hose.
