tribution to the war effort and is so recognized by leaders of the Red Cross and by high government officials. We appreciate the patriotism and loyalty displayed by the donors who have made their donations during the past year," Mrs. Kresse declared.

Rear Adm. Ross T. McIntire, Surgeon General, U. S. Navy, is quoted as saying: "Today the mortality rate among wounded Navy and Marine Corps fighting men is less than half that of the last war. This remarkable record, made on the high seas and the bloody beaches and in the jungles of the South Pacific, is due in large part to the use of plasma and serum albumen processed from blood donated by the people back home.

"Without question, the procurement of blood for the armed forces is one of the most important wartime activities in America. Thousands of additional donors are needed each week. Our fighting forces must be fully supplied."

Mrs. Kresse announced today that the blood bank units will visit Torrance ten times during the current year of 1944 and that the next one will be here on March 30 from 8:40 a.m. to 12:40 p.m.
