NEW TOKENS to SIMPLIFY RATIONING
Next week, retail food stores will start using the new red and blue tokens in transactions involving purchases of rationed foods. We are certain that the new plan will make your food shopping easier.
HERE'S HOW THE NEW "TOKEN" PLAN WILL OPERATE:
1 All new stamps that become effective after February 27 (red for meats etc., blue for canned & dried foods) will be worth ten points each, regardless of numbers printed upon them.
2 Grocers will give "change," using the new red and blue tokens. Red tokens for red stamps and blue tokens for blue stamps. Each token is valued at one point. Tokens are to be used for change only—stamps cannot be "cashed" into tokens.
3 Stamps will become valid in strips across the page (8's first, then 5's, etc.) the OPA will publish effective dates.
4 Tokens will have no expiration date. They are to remain valid indefinitely.
5 Green and brown stamps that are still effective will retain the point value printed upon them, (8, 5, 2, 1). Tokens may be given in change for both green and brown stamps.
