

Jordan Lists Legislative Candidates

Frank M. Jordan, secretary of state and California's chief election officer, today released the official list of candidates for the consolidated primary elections May 16 and which showed 324 men and women aspirants for 124 congressional and state legislative posts.

Jordan said of the total candidates for nomination 164 are registered Republicans, 156 Democrats and four Prohibitionists.

Eight Republicans are running against four Democrats for United States Senate; Congress, 43 Republicans, 36 Democrats, 2 Prohibition; state senate, 18 Republicans, 13 Democrats; state assembly, 95 Republicans, 103 Democrats, 2 Prohibition.

Jordan's figures disclosed that there are more candidates running for the one seat in the United States Senate than any other office. Eleven men and one woman are in this race.

In the campaign for the 23 seats in the house of representatives, three women are participating, with ten running for the state assembly.

In only one congressional district, the fifth, is the incumbent unopposed.

For the 20 seats being sought in the state senate, 12 candidates are unopposed.

The state assembly race shows 24 of the 80 offices are unopposed.

The list of legislative candidates to be voted for in this area are:

United States Senator—Phillip Bancroft, William G. Bonelli, Roland C. Casad, Justus F. Craemer, Sheridan Downey, Frederick F. Houser, Charles G. Johnson, John J. Taheny and Jack B. Tenney are running on both Republican and Democratic tickets. Alonzo J. Riggs qualified only as a Republican candidate; John S. Crowder and Irene M. Dockweiler only as Democrats.

Representative in Congress, 17th District—Lyndon R. Foster and Frederick Rose filed only on the Republican ticket and Leonard DiMicieli for the Democratic nomination. Byrdon R. Greene, Cecil R. King, Edwin M. Reinheimer and Vee O. Walker will contest for both the Republican and Democratic nomination.

State Assemblyman, 68th District—Clifton A. Hix, San Pedro attorney, seeks the Republican nomination, and R. L. Donley, our petition circulators. All San Pedro, the Democratic. Vincent Thomas, also from San Pedro, is contesting for both the Republican and Democratic nomination.

Torrance Apartment Rent Ceiling Trials Continued One Week

Five asserted tenants of the Mayflower Apartments in Torrance—F. A. Pringle, Lawrence Kasper, Fred Bollin, Orville McGlochen and Mack Brown—each filed complaints against S. A. and Anna Koch, owners of the apartments, charging them with violation of the OPA rental ceiling regulations.

Only the Pringle case was taken up and completed after a nearly all-day session, when the court issued an order continuing further consideration of the four other cases until tomorrow, March 24. It is expected all of them will be disposed of at that time.
