company and its subsidiaries to the current American Red Cross drive in western areas where plants and offices are located. Torrance's quota for institutions was fixed at \$10,000. These allocations, it was said in an official statement, are subscribed on an equitable basis depending on the size and number of operations in the communities spread over the Pacific coast states and Utah.

During the coming week, to spur individual subscriptions, tables will be set up in the two Torrance banks and in the foyers of the theaters attended by volunteer Red Cross workers who will receive monies and give receipts for the sums collected. Window stickers and buttons will be given to all persons subscribing \$1 or larger amounts.

SENDS NAPLES SIGN . . .

Capt. Pat Boyle has a hobby of picking up souvenirs and antiques in addition to helping in the war to subdue Hitler. His latest is a reflector highway sign found on the "Road to Naples" which has been received by Jack Hallanger, commander of the American Legion post in Torrance.

Capt. Pat Boyle Ships Road Sign Found at Naples

Capt. Pat Boyle of Torrance, who is with Gen. George Patton's Fifth Army somewhere in the European theater, has sent a "part of Italy" to Torrance American Legion Post.

Last Monday morning Commander Jack Hallanger received a crate about four feet in length and a foot in width with the contents securely wrapped in burlap sacks, on which \$6.35 was collected from Hallanger for expressage. On the inside was a reflector directional sign with an arrow pointing toward Naples, which fell to the Allies after the Germans had used the "scorched earth" policy on nearly everything in sight before being chased out by the invading army of the American forces.

Captain Boyle, is picking up souvenirs wherever he travels and since first landing in North Africa and going later to Sicily and elsewhere, there has been no exception. Hardly a week passes without he ships something home to his wife and daughter in Torrance. But when he came across the sign, his thoughts ran toward the American Legion post in his home town, so he bundled it up carefully and sent it on the way.

The sign will have a place in the Legion hall when members of the post gets funds enough together to purchase another one—which may be in the near future. So when Captain Boyle comes home it will be there waiting for him and, no doubt, said Commander Hallanger, he will have an interesting story to tell about how the sign came into his possession, as well as about many other interesting experiences in fighting the Jerries in this war, which are military secrets now.


