Chest, representing the C.I.O. Several hundred War Chest leaders attended the meeting. Thirty-two new members were elected to the directorate and 108 members re-elected. The board now consists of 250 leading citizens representing 13 cities and 13 unincorporated areas joined in the War Chest, as well as representatives of labor, business, industry, war relief services, health and welfare agencies of the home front, educational and religious groups.

Among other reports made was that of the distribution of \$7,808,031.69 in contributions to the War Chest. Allocations were as follows: National War Fund, \$3,171,031.60, which includes the USO, United Seamen's Service, War Prisoners Aid and 15 other agencies of foreign relief; the Los Angeles Community Welfare Federation (for 92 local health and welfare agencies), \$3,195,201.60; American War Community Services, \$30,000; Naval Aid Auxiliary, \$39,854.59; Citizen's Committee for Army and Navy, \$28,467.93; The War Services Council, \$5,693.76.



Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee (special designation of 5% of CIO members' subscriptions), \$15,000; reserve for uncollectible pledges, \$169,089.60; campaign budget, 15 months, \$213,880; Public Information Department, all year and campaign publicity, 12 months, \$98,381.40; administration and collection department, 18 months budget, \$56,162.

The War Chest executive committee suggested to the Community Welfare Federation that "all or a substantial proportion of the local agencies' share of campaign overage be placed in a post-war reserve" to help meet the problems of the conversion period, provide for postponed building repairs, etc.

Local agency allocations will soon be publicly announced by the welfare federation budget committee, which studies the needs and makes allocation to the local health and welfare agencies, it was announced. The War Chest goal was originally set for \$6,805,050.






U. S. Steel's employees averaged 340,498 in 1943. They established in 1943 an all-time ingot production record. 100,000 men and women of U. S. Steel are in the armed forces. To replace these employees, and to meet manpower requirements, nearly 125,000 employees have been trained by U. S. Steel. Approximately 5,000 demobilized servicemen have been re-employed.

U. S. Steel's 222,602 stockholders would fill the Rose Bowl 2½ times. For this army of owners, U. S. Steel earned in 1943 the smallest return on investment (3.97%) in any year of large production. Rising costs in 1943, pushing against price ceilings, resulted in lower net earnings and therefore in lower taxes. There were \$8 million less for future needs than in 1942 (\$53 million less than in 1941), despite a substantial increase in receipts in 1943.


